Sorry Little Ivy Melosh is not well at present, but hope to hear of her recovery soon.

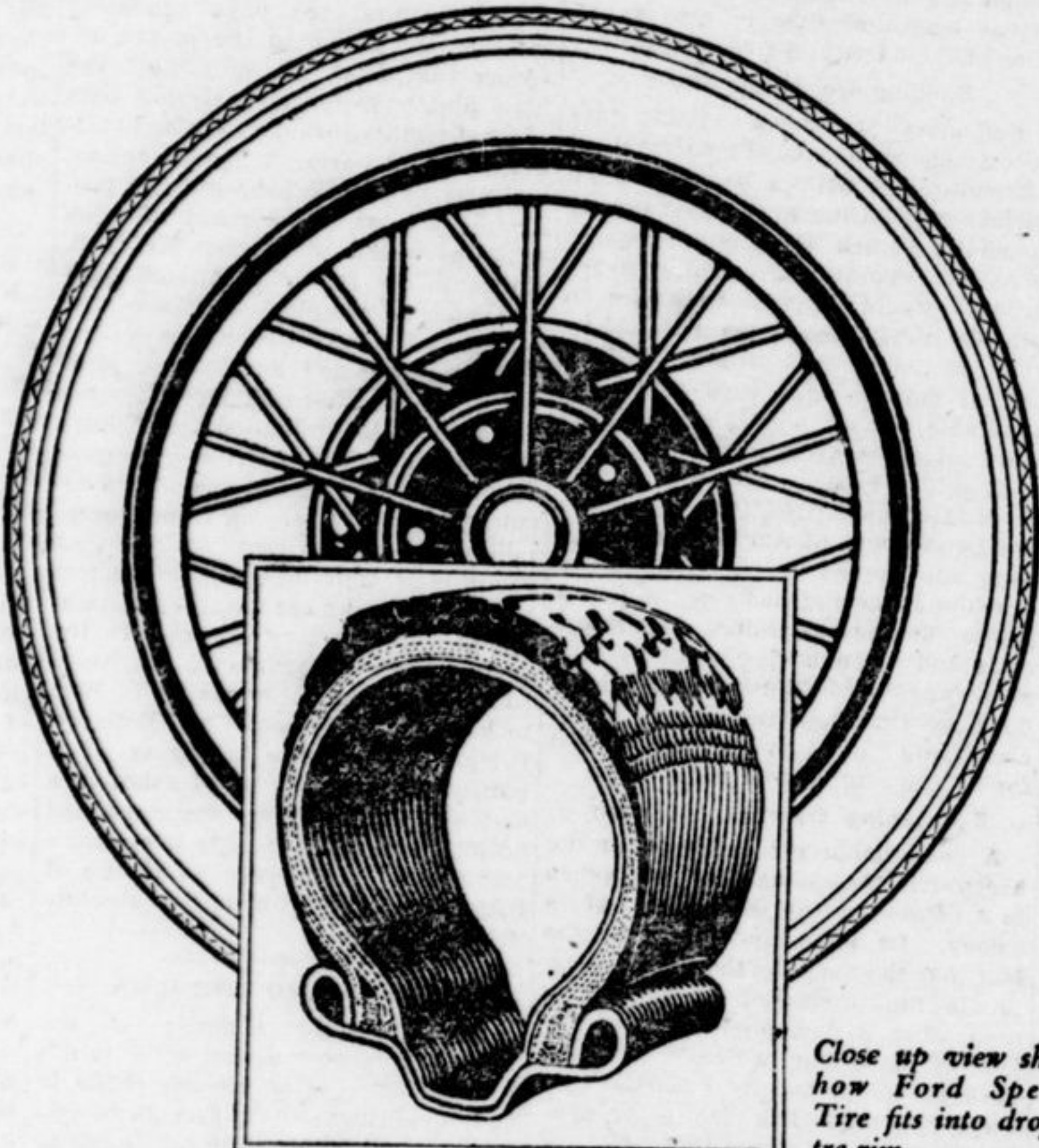
