## History of Fairbairn Congregation

The part of Egremont now known as Fairbairn Congregation began to be settled in the autumn of 1854. Previous to that date the Red Indian held sway. His many traps and deadfalls along the streams were evidence of his cunning and sagacity.

The first settlers on the 13th and 14th cons in this locality were the families of Calder, McEachern, McGillivray, Orr, McInnis and Sinclair, natives of Islay, Scotland.

On the 10th con, the families of Thos Waddell and Alex Ritchie were settled. These Scotch settlers brought with them reverence for the Lord's Day and the House of God.

The first meeting for public worship within the limits of Fairbairn congregation was held at the home of the late Malcolm McInnis, in the month of May, 1855. The service was conducted by the late John McCaffery, a layman, who conducted services in the south of Egremont for some years.

Sabbath Schools were early established and by this means the Gospel Torch shed its light abroad until public worship established by missionaries sent in by the Presbytery of Hamilton.

Students from Knox College held meetings in the schoolhouses and private dwellings and barns wherever it was convenient to meet the settlers.

Of these we name the Rev. John McMillan, afterwards minister at Mount Forest and Rev. John Morrison, late of Cedarville, whose work of faith and labor of love has borne much fruit in Grey County.

er. On April 19th, 1911, a call was given to Rev. Jas. Malcolm. In April 1913, Rev. James Malcolm resigned because of ill health. In Dec 1913, Rev. D. B. Marsh, S. D., F.R.A.S., was inducted. In March 1914, Robt. Aitken, elder, removed. In May 1914, Hugh Sinclair and Frederick Dillon were elected elders. In May 1915, John R. Philp, elder, removed. On March 16, 1916, Mrs. D. B. Marsh, wife of our pastor, died. Gone but not forgotten. January 1917, Rev. D. B. Marsh resigned to engage in pastoral work at Pickering, Ont. July 10, 1917, Rev. G. S. Scott was inducted. Rev. Wallace Johnston followed Rev. Mr. Scott, and he in turn by Rev. G. Graham, present minister.

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Holstein, July 8, 1929  
Dear Sir:  
After considerable hesitation, I am still somewhat reluctant to enter into an exposition of the reasons for our removal to the County Council in June, to have the county road in Egremont changed from the present layout; but as an ordinary taxpayer in the Township of Egremont, I am compelled by the call of duty to make a few observations through the medium of your valuable paper that may be interesting to the taxpayers of the Township and others outside who appear to be taking unwarranted and inconsistent interest in this matter.

It appears that the main arguments used at the County Council was that this would be a straight road from one highway to the other and that it would build up the county the cost of building and maintaining 2 1/2 extra miles of road and Mr. Bell said it would save the county \$800 a year for maintenance alone. But it never seemed to enter the minds of either our own representatives that that would be quite a saving to the taxpayers if the road remained where it is, as Mr. Bell has county and provincial roads, north and south and east and west through his town and they are full of crooks. Why does he want to bring a road away from the only growing village we have in the township. Mr. Bell has an axe to grind and he's getting our boys to turn the stone.

Since when did our Reeve get converted to the idea of a straight road: to run all year he wanted the road then south through the 16th con to the 2nd, then he didn't want it to go to the 14th to the 2nd, then south through Holstein. One of these roads had more crooks in it than the present one but the same mileage. This year as Reeve, along with the Deputy Reeve, he is doing his prettiest to deprive the Township of 2 1/2 miles of straight road. All because he wants a straight road? What do you think? Who will be having his axe sharpened in this case? And who will be turning the grindstone?

The Reeve of Proton is also a local convert to the straight road idea but in 1926 and 1927, he brought a motion at county council asking instead of the road turn south at Hopkville in Egremont where it now turns south, he wanted it to turn north. He was defeated because Egremont had a reeve and deputy at that time who knew that 2 1/2 miles of county road was an asset to the Township and we need it. The 2 1/2 miles to give us an equal mileage to Proton anyhow. So you see that the modest Reeve of Proton was willing at that time to put up with a crooked mile in the road if it increased his mileage a mile to the crook. But now the road is built straight through in Proton, in Egremont, "Oh consistency, thou art a jewel!" But the actions of our representatives in the past put forth strenuous and prolonged efforts to retain. This is something like a poor man calling a millionaire a pauper.

This is a gift of money. I don't care and I hope that the Highway Department will save Egremont from its representatives.
