H. School in Good Standing

The High School Board met as per statute on Monday night and while it was not a full meeting, discussion went on as to the need for tinting the walls of the High School. It was decided that such a step was necessary and eventually this inside work will be done. The Board are greatly pleased over the report of Inspector Levan, given as a result of his visit to the school in the late spring. He has the highest praise for the school staff and equipment and pronounced it equal to the best pro ratio to its size.

The financial standing of the High School is also in sound condition and they are quite confident that the rate to be struck for the School's needs for 1929-1930, will be no higher than that of last year, if not a little less. They purpose starting out in September with a staff of five, where formerly was six, but of course this will only be in condition that a five teacher staff does the work satisfactorily. Efficiency is the first essential.
