**Is Awarded Damages**  
Mrs Margaret Highley was granted \$5000 damages at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, by Justice McEvoy, in her claim against the Canadian Pacific Railway. The claim was laid as an outcome of an accident in which a C.P.R. engine hit her motor car at McWilliams Station, permanently injuring the plaintiff and killing her husband, the late John Highley.

**Death of Angus McLeod in Michigan**  
The death took place on July 31st, in Clare, Mich., of Mr Angus McLeod, a one-time Priceville resident. He was in his 73rd year and many of the older residents of Glenelg will remember him. He was twice married and with his widow, he leaves three daughters and one son to mourn his demise. His first wife was Miss Jessie Black of Bunnassan, sister to J. A. Black, Chesley.

Her illness was of a sudden nature and she was gone before her friends could realize the fact. Deceased was a daughter of a former Presbyterian minister in Hanover, Rev Mr Jackson. With the sorely bereaved husband and two infant sons—one four years old and the other one and one half, the sympathy of the community goes out in large measure.

## Infraction of L. C. A. Brings Heavy Fines

Four liquor cases were heard before Magistrate Spereiman here last Friday afternoon, three of them arising from the raid made at Herb Murdock's and the Hahn House the previous week, by Prov'l Officers, all of whom were present. Crown Attorney Dyer represented the crown.

Oscar Hahn was found guilty of having liquor in his room in a public house, and a fine of \$100 and costs amounting to \$39.40, was imposed. Judgment was reserved in the case against his father Mr Val Hahn.

A fine of \$50 and costs of \$75 was imposed upon Herbert Murdock, also for a L. C. A. infraction. He was represented by Barrister Campbell Grant of Walkerton.

The charge against Pat Shea and H Goodyear, who reside a few miles east of Mt Forest, was that of having unsealed liquor in a car on the highway. Their counsel was Barrister Clarke, Mt Forest. Shea swore he owned the Dodge car, but both denied knowledge of the bottles being in front seat of car, until after Lytle's, a Proton family where they called, had removed one of the bottles, which was analyzed, and found to contain liquor with over 11 per cent alcohol. The magistrate dismissed charge against Goodyear, but fined Shea, the owner of the car, \$100 and costs of nearly \$40 for the offence.

## Had Eyes Blown Out at Hanover Celebration

Durham girls lost in Softball to Walkerton 16 to 21.

Thos. Brownlee, veteran of the Great War, was severely injured about the face Monday evening, during the course of the large Civic Holiday celebration held in Hanover when a flare, which he was lighting, exploded prematurely. The explosion burned out the left eye of the unfortunate man entirely, while little hope of saving the right eye is held.

Mr Brownlee was bending over the flare, lighting it, during the course of a sham battle. Before he had time to get away the flare exploded into his face, causing the serious and painful injuries. The accident cast a gloom over an otherwise splendid holiday.

The celebration Monday, was one of the largest ever held in Hanover. An extensive program of sports, lasting throughout the entire day, had been planned and the weather conditions were splendid.

In the athletic events, the ladies' 75 yard dash was the only event Durham contested and Durham girls, Anna Ritchie and Dorothy Ritchie won first and second, receiving gold and silver medals.

The military tattoo at night, was a brilliant spectacle, ten bands taking part, with a crowd of 5000 or more in attendance. The fireworks display was good, marred only by the aforementioned incident.

A street dance on new pavement in front of Knechtel factory, concluded the night's celebration.

## Five Petitions before Council; Tax Rate 52 Mills

Tuesday night's Town Council session was petition night, no less than five being presented, four of them having questions.

O. S. Hunter spoke on behalf of ratepayers from Albert St. to Lambton St. bridge, who wanted a 30 foot wide concrete pavement only. Another petition asked for a 34 ft asphalt top pavement on Lambton St. (between Albert and Elgin Sts.). Reeve Bell thought it should be 34 ft wide for the two blocks, Coun Whitmore spoke similarly, Coun Noble said both blocks must be same finish: Coun Howell stated ratepayers' wishes should be removed. To settle the discussion:

Whitmore—Bell moved that a 34 ft wide pavement, concrete base with asphalt top, be laid between Garafraxa and Elgin Sts. Whitmore, Bell, Noble voted in favor; Howell, McLean, and Stonehouse against and Mayor Murdock gave the deciding vote in favor of motion.

Ed. Kress spoke for petitioners in Calder Block who wished curb lowered and sidewalk raised, now being lower than base of pavement in front. It will be looked into.

Other petitions were from David Kinnee and 22 others south of Smith larness shop, protesting against deep ditch at side of pavement and from W J McBride asking for lighting at north end of town.

To maintain a wig-wag at C.P.R. Gara. St. crossing, 40 per cent comes from grade crossing fund. A letter from C.P.R. was read, suggesting that for remaining 60, half cost should be paid by CPR and half by Highway Dept. A motion concurring in this was passed, moved by Noble-Bell, and the Clerk authorized to forward same to Railway Board.

Insp. Winter of the Post Office Dept. replied to a suggestion that a drinking fountain be installed in front of Post Office, asking that full information be given and assurance of upkeep by town. It was laid over.

Accounts totalling \$1817.84 were passed, including \$1200 to Sinking Fund. The placing of a new permanent roof on Fire Hall was left with the Property Com.

The tax rate for 1929 was struck at 52 mills, the same as last year. This year payments on one bylaw expired amounting to \$845 and Public School estimates are over \$400 lower, but County rate is increased from 8 to 10 mills, making increase of over \$1000 annual payment. The Finance Com. figured that rate could be held stationary this year, but next year, when payments for pavement commence, a slight increase will probably be necessary.
