All property belonged to the group. All worked for the community, as the grandfather directed, and all gains went into the common treasury, also held by the grandfather. Fathers, 45 or 50 years old, had to ask this chief for money to buy shoes for the children or slates or lead pencils, or anything else. Naturally, such a state of affairs seemed undesirable to the latest "younger generation" and they have insisted on having their own homes and enterprises. This has required much division of land and animals and machinery, and would have been very difficult if the whole community had not co-operated to help the young

## Large Electric Power Systems

It has become the custom to rate as lare electric power systems those inter-connected plants under one financial control and management with an annual output of 100,000,000-kilowatt-hours or more. The latest figures available show that Canada has 17 such systems, of which each of the first four averages nearly two and a half billion kilowatt hours per annum. The interconnection of electric power plants into large systems has been proved to give great advantages in economy, efficiency, and reliability of service, and these 17 systems represent over 90 per cent. of the total central station output in the Dominion.

## Bituminous Sand in Canada

There is no established production of bituminous sand in Canada as yet. Prior to 1927 approximately 2,000 tons had been shipped from the Alberta deposits for use in connection with laboratory investigations and for demonstration purposes. During 1927 shipments agregating upwards of 3,-000tons were used for demonstration purposes at Edmonton and Jasper, Alberta, chiefly for surfacing roads and walks.

## Minerals in Canadian Arctic

Exploration has indicated that the rocks of the Canadian Arctic mainland and archipelgo are similar to those that charcterize the southern and better known parts of the Dominion. A number of economic minerals are known to exist at different points, although the extent and value of these deposits, which include coal of Carboniferous and Tertiary age, and graphite, mica, and native copper of Precambrian age, have not yet been determined.
