### CRAWFORD

The late Duncan McKinnon Tuesday a.m. Aug. 27th, Mr Duncan McKinnon passed beyond the shadows at the home of Mr Jas McDougall, which was formerly the McKinnon homestead, where the deceased was born over 58 years ago. For a number of years, the late Mr McKinnon had not enjoyed robust health, but was able to work his farm until the death of his mother nine years ago. He was a successful farmer, a kind neighbor and was ever held in the highest respect and veneration. He bore his long illness with Christian patience and resignation. On the Thursday previous to death, he suffered a paralytic stroke from which he never rallied and he passed peacefully away on above date. During his illness he was tenderly cared for by Mr and Mrs McDougall.

Deceased was a son of the late Mr and Mrs Neil McKinnon and with the passing of Duncan, there passes out of this community that well and favorably known family name, McKinnon.

The family members surviving are: Angus, Glenisde, Sask.; Allan, Edmonton; John, California; Mrs Brown (Maggie) of Chilliwack, B.C. Two sisters, Mrs And. Milne, Brant and Mrs Jas McDougall passed away two and a half years ago. To those who mourn we extend the sympathy of the community in their third bereavement in such a short time.

The funeral was Thursday from the old home to Rocky Saugeen cemetery, Rev. Young having charge of service at home and grave. He delivered a comforting message, from Psalm 39: 4, "Lord make me to know mine end, and the measure of my days, what it is: that I may know how frail I am." In the pastor's discourse, he stated that these temporary bodies of ours may be frail, but we may have the noblest mind and character, as Paul had, who was afflicted with a thorn in the flesh. Two of his favorite hymns, "Shall we gather at the river" and "Safe in the Arms of Jesus" were sung.

The late Mr McKinnon was a member of Crawford United Church and when able was a regular attendant at divine service. Floral offerings on the casket bespoke sympathy and esteem. ### With two Others Rescues Drowning Victims

Archibald Davidson of Port McNicoll receives Certificate from Royal Humane Society.

Mr Archibald Davidson, in the employ of the C.P.R. at Port McNicoll for some years, has, with two others, Car Inspector Alex McCullough and Constable Harry Givens, both of that town, been signally honored by the Royal Humane Society when they were presented with parchment certificates, for rescuing from drowning on March 27th last, Mrs Gaudreault, her daughter Margaret Sylvie aged 14, all of Victoria Harbor. They were crossing to Port McNicoll when the ice gave way.

A public meeting was held at Port McNicoll to honor these brave gentlemen, and there was a record attendance from the district. The meeting was presided by the Mayor of Midland, the Deems of Port McNicoll and Hon. William Finlayson, Minister of Lands and Forests of the Ontario government, who presented the certificates. General E. de B. Panet, chief of the investigation dept. of the railway and Horace Grout, general supt. of the Bruce division, also spoke in eulogistic terms of the recipients.

Archie is the third Durham boy to

our knowledge, who has been recognized by the Royal Humane Society for bravery in saving lives from the watery deep. We congratulate him on this action. The other two have been Dr. D B Jamieson and Donald Knight.
