PRICEVILLE'S WAR MEMORIAL

A Fine Memorial Service to the Fallen Heroes

Priceville Honors Itself. — A large Assembly met at the Monument.

Sunday afternoon last there were done in Priceville. The patriotic fervor of that community and carried out successfully a Joint Memorial Service which was a chaste and pleasing demonstration in honor of all who served and in loving memory of those who died for the cause of Freedom and Justice in the Great War.

The monument was surrounded by flags and higher than the monument floated a large Union Jack. A large flag-bedecked platform on the north, and facing the monument held the speakers and a large and efficient composite choir, from the two churches and several visitors. Major J. W. McGillivray was the happily chosen chairman and admirably conducted the proceedings.

Scores of cars rolled into the village and before the service commenced, an assembly of almost a thousand and filled all seats placed, cars surrounding the memorial and in front of St. Columba Church.
