

Egremont School Fair was Biggest Yet

The Egremont School Fair at Holstein Monday, went over the top, both in attendance and exhibits, and in both respects, now rivals the fall fair. Eleven of the township schools competed in exhibits and seven in parade, showing the wide interest taken.

The singing contests were heard in Agri Hall where the crowd was too large for all to jam in. Girls' solo was again won by Irma Rife, Holstein No. 3; 2nd by Alma McDougall, 6; 3rd, Aura McGuire 3; 4th, Mary McEachern 10; 5th, Jessie Stevenson 4; in Boys' solo, Lloyd Long 10, was first, Lloyd Kinsman, 14; 2nd, and Clifford McCannell 14, 3rd.

All other events took place in the Park, but while a fine afternoon, a strong wind hindered the crowd hearing speaking and spelling contests. The winners were: Diction, contests speaking—Jas Hill 10; Rae Adams 12; Lloyd Tyndall 3. Other contestants were Vincent Ellis 3, Wilbert Schenk 9, Elmer Love 3, Lorne McDougall 13, Spelling—Mary Kerr 1 Eg & N., C. Falkingham 12, 2nd, Jessie Stevenson 4, Alma McDougall 6, Ivan Christie 3.

In First Aid Competition, Clara Watson and Clara Falkingham No 12 were first; Ruby Gardner and Annie Eurig, No 4, second. Mouth orator contest saw 9 entries. Clarence Moore, No 13, won; his sister, Dianne, 12, 2nd; Morley Hunter, No 6 was 3rd; Lloyd Long 10, 4th and Loyal Mercer, 5, 5th. In Folk Dancing, Lloyd Long 10, was the only entrant.

An interesting feature was the presentation of W. Institute medal to Jessie Stevenson, No 4, for highest standing at Entrance in Holstein this year.

The parade of 7 schools with 162 pupils was the big event, being judged for march, deportment, identity, drill, decoration, yell and song. Holstein school (No 3) this year, were winners, No 12 school (Miss Mervyn) teacher, was ineligible, having won three years in succession. Following is the standing:
