An interesting display upstairs was that of wood carving, picture frames, etc. by A. R. Hershey. In fine arts, some excellent work was on view, and we noted Miss Fisher, Yeovil teacher, took first in several classes. N. E. McGuire had a large card of fine snap shots views of Holstein, which also won first.

On the grounds there were probably as many horses exhibited as ever at Holstein and the judge had an all afternoon busy session. In one class we noted eight horses entered. The cattle and other stock classes were well filled, but the prize list, which will appear next week, will give full particulars of all winners.

Rev. C. E. Rogers, Sexsmith, Alberta, delivers stirring address in Knox United Church Sunday morning last.

"Thank God for those who have been raised in Grey and Bruce Counties and that they overflowed into the Peace River country." Such was one of the many statements of Rev. C. E.
