McGuire had a large card of fine snap shots views of Holstein, which also won first.

On the grounds there were probably as many horses exhibited as ever at Holstein and the judge had an all afternoon busy session. In one class we noted eight horses entered. The cattle and other stock classes were well filled, but the prize list, which will appear next week, will give full particulars of all winners.
