WELL KNOWN CITIZEN Passes away Sunday

JOHN G. ADAMS

Sunday morning last, the above well known citizen died at the home of his daughter, Mrs Wm Hooper, 19th con., Egremont. He had not been well for a year past owing to defective circulation and later, in spite of careful home nursing and medical attention, it was seen that the end was near and he passed out as above, having eight days before, entered his 71st year.

John Adams was born on 18th con. Egremont, oldest of a family of seven children, of whom survive one brother Frank in South Egremont and Agnes, Mrs Nelson of Holstein. The deceased members are William, Margaret, Rachael, Mrs Phillips, Lizzie, Mrs Middlebrook, and now John G. He followed his father's occupation, farming, for many years, and was reckoned successful. For years he took an interest in Egremont Agricultural Society and was a leading official for a number of years, even after coming to Durham. Growing to manhood, he married Miss Orpah Johnston, a happy union and to them were born two children, Victor, on 18th con., Egremont and Agnes, Mrs. Wm Hooper, on 19th con., at whose home he died.

Nearly 18 years ago the family moved to Durham and for most of these years he found employment with Durham Furniture Co. They became members of Knox Church and drew around them a new set of friends to add to the many they had formed in their first home.

John Adams was a good neighbor and friend and those who knew him best will long cherish his memory. For a number of years he was mission Secy and later Financial Secy of Knox Church and took a keen interest in the work.

His work is now done. As boy and man the editor knew him for 60 years and learned to appreciate his company and his character. Of late years he became an enthusiastic curler and bowler.

The funeral on Tuesday was very largely attended. A dozen or more of Durham friends were present, and from many parts of the township they gathered in respect for his memory.

The funeral service was taken by Rev Mr Fiddes, Durham, who preached a comforting message from Isaiah 26:3, "Thou will keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on Thee. He was assisted by Rev's Sullivan of Priceville and Purnell of Dromore.

Interment took place in Dromore cemetery, where his kindred lie. Pall bearers were Messrs. Alfred Haas, Jas Ferguson, Thos Reid, J. D. Drimmlie, Wm Leith.
