REVIEW'S FIGURES WERE MUCH THE CLOSEST

In the official election figures for South Grey, given out Friday night by Returning Officer H. G. Brigham of Hanover, the majority of F. R. Oliver was definitely fixed at 764, which is just 10 more than that published in the Review the morning after, 754. In last week's issue, our confere of the Chronicle complains of delay and no proper organization for receiving the vote on election night. We have never heard, in this riding at least, of any official being ever appointed to compile returns election night. It is usually left to the newspapers or interested supporters, and the Review that night announced 742 majority. Early next morning on receiving one or two more polls in detail, the majority was placed at 754, and the detailed vote published that day in the Review.

The Chronicle last week quoted its own total figures, 563, and Hanover Post 292, but failed to give the Review's majority. Instead stating "some give Oliver 700 odd, but we do not know." This it did know, as we assured the Chronicle scribe a day after election, that 754 was fairly close, and that official count would be at least 700 or more. We pointed out that lower estimates of other papers did not include all rural polls in two townships, which the Review's organization had received, but the Chronicle was reluctant to accept the higher total.

There's no doubt about it. To obtain the most accurate election figures promptly, the Chronicle and everyone else interested should read the Review.

Startling was the news that came over the radio Monday night that Hon. J. A. Robb had passed away. The more startling as that day's papers gave the gratifying news that the Finance Minister was more than holding his own. A stroke, in his weakened condition, hastened the end. He was in his seventy-first year.

His death has brought sketches of his character from numerous sources. Personally, even in politics, he had no enemies, and from Opposition Leader Bennett and other Conservatives came warmest tributes. From his own side of the House, as may be expected, heartfelt eulogies are uttered. All praise him as a man, and all acknowledge him to have been one of the best Finance Ministers in the history of Canada. He was a plain backbencher for a number of years till his good sense compelled admiration and drew him into notice. Premier King as did others, saw in him cabinet material, and he was appointed Finance Minister, in which position he has been a great success. Year by year he has seen reductions in debt, and all ways a suggestion of more to come. Suggestions as to his successor are

being made, and the name of Dunning is being mentioned. Whoever gets it may feel that he has a shining light to follow.
