There have been several horses die in this locality this fall. Last week Fred Knox, John Lane and Robert Watson each lost one, all dying rather suddenly. Horses are cheap when you have them for sale but when you go to buy a good one they are dear enough.

TO DISPOSE OF part of Buffalo Surplus Only 500 of annual increase in Wainwright to be marked this year The Department of the Interior has decided to reduce the surplus of the Government Buffalo herd in Buffalo national park at Wainwright, Alta. this Autumn by 500 animals and arrangements have been made for the slaughter of this number and the sale of the meat, hides and heads. Buffalo furs and other buffalo products have so re-established themselves in popular favor that markets could be readily found for a much larger number. The thinning out of the herd in recent years in order to keep it within the grazing limitations of the park, made it necessary to dispose annually of numbers of these animals and ship others north to Wood Buffalo Park. The number usually disposed of by this sale will this winter be reduced by half, but it is expected that after this year there will be annual surplus of 1000 or more animals for sale, in addition to any that may be sent north.

Meat from 100 carcasses of the older animals may be reserved by the Dept. for use in the Northwest Territories. The meat will be dried and utilized for the relief of the Indians and Eskimos in the far north, who may be incapacitated by illness or accident. When prepared in the form of pemmican, buffalo meat constitutes a concentrated and nutritious article of diet, very suitable for transporting and storing in the north country. MacDonald, preparing and mailing tax notices, \$17.50; postage \$4.94; on salary as Clerk \$75.00; C.P.R., demurrage on cement, \$7.00. Mr Malcolm Black presented Voucher No. 10 for payment of accounts re Road Improvement and Bridges, amounting to \$187.59, which was adopted and payment made accordingly. McGirr-Boyd: That this Council confirm the appointment of Mr John McKechnie (Glenacadren) as School Attendance Officer for north half of Township in place of Mr James Ledingham, resigned. Carried. The attention of prospective candidates for offices of Reeve of County of Glengeld is respectfully called to an amendment to the Municipal Act in 1929, whereby all candidates are required to present a certificate from the Township Treasurer showing that all municipal taxes on property of which he is owner or tenant in the Municipality are paid. The amendment also states that the Clerk shall not place on the ballot the name of any person who fails to file such certificate with his declaration. Council adjourned to Dec. 16, 1929. H. H.
