Egremont Council

Council met Nov. 18th. Members all present. Minutes adopted.

Robb-Mack—That the report of the Road Supt. for work on roads and bridges be adopted. Carried.

Mack-McEachern: That the Co. Treasurer be paid the sum of \$3.85, being balance of amount of arrears of taxes against lot part 25, con. 17, Car. Mack-Robb: In case of an adjourned sale of the Rhoda Way property, that the Reeve be authorized to attend sale and protect the Township's interests. Carried.

Mack-Robb: In reference to the circumstances re the Mill property, lot part 2 of 16, con 1, that Mr. Dickson be exempt from paying the taxes on said property to the amount of the Township rate. Carried.

A deputation from the South end of the Township waited upon the Council in reference to the condition of the Drury sideroad.

McEachern-Robb: That the Council authorize the expenditure of \$150 on said sideroad from schoolhouse south, gravel to be put on after freeze up. Carried.

Robb-McEachern: That a grant of \$25 be given to the School Fair. Car.

A By-law was passed to provide a place for holding a meeting for the Nominations of candidates for municipal Council, 1930, and appointing Dep. Rec. Officers, poll clerks and polling places as follows: Div No 1, J. T. Brown, S. M. Patterson lot 1 con 20; Div. No 2, Wm. Leith, Irwin Geddes, lot 19 con 20; Div. No 3, Wm. H. Rogger, Hubert McDougall, Agr'l Hall, Holstein; Div. No 4, Clarence Ross, Gladstone Melmes, lot 15 con 14; Div. No 5, Neil Iles, Jos. Burke, G. A. Con 6; Div No 6, E. Russell, Wm. McArthur, lot 21 con 7.

A by law was also passed authorizing the Reeve to sell the timber on road allowance boundary line Egremont and Proton between cons 14 and 15, Egremont Tp.
