### GILBERT AND SULLIVAN NEVER DID ANYTHING BETTER THAN THIS.

There is a touch of comic opera in the situation that has arisen through the controversy over the price of newsprint.

Gilbert and Sullivan never produced anything more touching than the scene in which the two Premiers of two great Canadian provinces plead with an American magnate named Groulx to raise the price of the paper he manufactures. It somehow reminds you of pleading with a child to take candy.

And there is something almost kingly in the way in which Mr Granstein bows to "Canadian sentiment." "We are Canadian in our sympathy and outlook" he declares as he prepares to submit to the lofty pleadings of the Premiers and presumably with tears streaming down his cheeks sacrifices his finer feelings to the extent of putting an extra \$5 in his pocket for every ton of paper his mills produce.

Meanwhile, pressure might be brought to bear on Premier Ferguson to do a little sacrificing on his own part. Might he not be asked to curtail his visits to Montreal and to deprive himself more frequently of the company of the aristocratic and distinguished Mr Taschereau?

For his every visit to the Quebec metropolis appears to have a visible effect on the Montreal stock market. That Beauharnois contract he brought back on his last visit will go a long way to financing a private power corporation that is doing its best to hold back its development of that part of the St Lawrence energy that is the legitimate property of Ontario and the Hydro.

Nor will the addition of \$5 per ton to the price of newsprint do anything to deflate the price of those paper stocks that are the pride of Montreal.
