## HOME FROM ARCTIC WATERS

No little sensation has been caused this last week or two by the rescue of the McAlpine party from Arctic barrens. It will be remembered McAlpine and seven companions set out for the far North by aeroplane, last September, and for five weeks all trace of them was lost. Fears were expressed for their welfare, but daring men set off by plane in search of them. After weary weeks the welcome news came that they were found. They had endured much, civilized food became exhausted, and it is safe to say that, but for the Eskimos, they would have fared worse. It was sheer joy when they found they were rescued. Much had to be done to get them back to civilization, much had to be endured, one of them had his feet frozen, but at last they got out by twos and threes, and last week end, arrived in Winnipeg.

For three weeks they had to ration their food, which was scarce. They are loud in their praise of the Eskimos, who showed much kindness and were rewarded by presents, but the question arises, what has been accomplished? We have had the spectacle of brave men facing and enduring unknown dangers, of equally brave men setting out to give relief, and that is worth something. But for skill and modern science, the fate of the McAlpine party might have been that of Franklin.

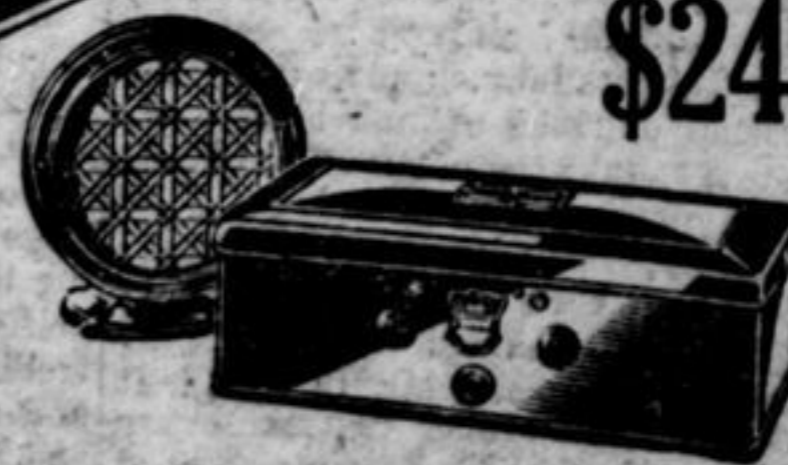
