PRICEVILLE

Rev. R. G. Stewart Inducted Thursday last

The induction of the Rev. R. G. Stewart as pastor of Priceville and Swinton Park Presbyterian congregations took place in the Hall here on Thursday at 1.30. The poor train service here was felt as very inconvenient. They, the ministers, engaged in the function were kindly transported from Flesherston Station by the mail man, Wm Aldcorn. Rev. Mr. Readie instituted the Presbytery by prayer, with ministers and local elders constituting the session. The Psalm, "Ye gates, lift up your heads on high" was an opening hymn of praise by the congregation. Rev. Mr. Douglas, recently inducted into Caledonia East and Claude congregations, after singing "Breathe on me, breath of God", preached, emphasizing the teaching of Christ and the Holy Spirit. The whole tendency of Paul's worship, indicated a something in the future. Christ is God's manifestation to us. The Spirit is a medium of communication with God. Paul's whole conception of the Holy Spirit, taking up the work of Christ. The Spirit had come to regenerate and redeem the lost members of society. The three abiding characters are Faith, Hope and Love, the greatest of these being Love. This closed a fine sermon.

Rev. Mr. Readie, Hillsburg, interim moderator, narrated the steps taken in giving the call, followed by the usual questions and declarations, which were answered freely and satisfactorily by Rev. Mr. Stewart. The congregation promising by the uplifted hand, to support, cherish, uphold and accept the religious teachings of their pastor, followed by prayer and the right hand of fellowship.

Rev. Mr. Lee of Erin, but recently called to Bobaycon, addressed the minister, and stressed the necessity of possessing the Holy Spirit. We have too few references to the Holy Spirit in our present day: congratulated Mr. Stewart on his acceptance of the call but would find problems and troubles here as well as in the West, and days of gloom and despondency. It was unnecessary to inform him to have recourse to that help on high which would stimulate to higher service. Be faithful to your own heart and to your people, to warn them that what a man soweth, that shall he also reap. Courage, intelligence and tact—the latter particularly, was eloquently stressed. Give your people something to think about and everyone plenty to do. Perfect private life is essential, be yourself what you expect your people to be and wished him a long and happy pastorate.

Rev. Mr. Grabe, Orangeville, addressed the people, dwelling strongly upon the relationship and responsibility as applicable to the congregation. God's business is the congregation's business: be imbued with that spirit it matters not where. The congregation was congratulated on securing Rev. Mr. Stewart: co-operation was needed though by them. "Pray for him" was the exhortation. We are all human, so is he, open your hearts to him, and give him every encouragement, was the closing admonition. The Doxology closed the meeting with the benediction by Rev. Mr. Annand.

"Time and tide waiting for no man," a hurried bite and invigorating cup of tea was had, when the visiting clergy beat a hasty retreat to the station, the warning whistle being heard in the distance. A bounteous supper was thereafter served by willing winsome waiters.
