### HECTOR MCKINNON ASSISTED IN FRAMING FAMOUS BUDGET

### Mt. Forest Choral Society Present Comic Opera

**"Aladdin and his Wonderful Lamp"** Thursday night last, May 1st proved to be an unfortunate one for the caste of Mount Forest Choral Society in presenting their comic opera here, "Aladdin and his Wonderful Lamp", for they had to return home during a violent electric storm. It was a great pity that Aladdin couldn't have turned his magic lamp to good use on this occasion.

The company, about 37 in all, put on an entertaining show and the audience gave them good hearing for a couple of hours. If any criticism may be given, it was for the numerous promptings that were necessary. The costumes were of the Eastern type, brilliant and spectacular, and in no small degree lent to the success of the play. The work of Aladdin (Ivan Chalmers); his wicked uncle, Harvey Grant); the Emperor (Rev. H. B. Scudamore and Prime Minister (J. Black) were outstanding among male characters, while Mrs J. Black and Miss Chalmers had the leading roles among the ladies. Each possessed a beautiful voice and sang with good effect. The dancing of the young children was a special treat which received much applause.

The scenic effects and background were well adapted for the opera and reflected the work of the artist, Ivan Chalmers.

Cochran, former pastor of College St. Presbyterian Church, Toronto and at present Home Mission Secretary of the United Church of Canada, will occupy the pulpit.

### Council with Board of Trade 24 Free Kodaks Distributed in Durham and Vicinity

Monday night's session of the Town Council was the lengthiest to date, it being almost midnight when adjournment was made. All except Coun. Noble were present.

On behalf of the Board of Trade, President T. M. McFadden addressed the Council regarding the changing around of the cattle pens, planting hedges and generally improving the grounds in rear of Town Hall and market scales. A sort of Arbor Day would be staged when members of the Board of Trade and other citizens would assist in the work, but any expenses incurred would be to be borne by the town. Reeve Bell favored the idea if cost was kept to a minimum; we should go easy at present and spend little, as already heavy tax bills were in sight. Coun. Smith thought expense would be small, especially if Board of Trade would help to dig postholes! Mayor Hunter suggested leaving matter to Property Com., but Coun. Hunter moved that Property Com. be empowered to move fence back and get a fill required for levelling. It was left to Board of Trade to make deal for fill and then report to and work with Property Com.

A resolution was passed approving the building of new C.P.R. station on present site. The legal opinion from Long and Daly, Toronto, guaranteeing the validity of Town of Durham paving bonds, was received and read. The account of this firm, amounting to \$275.00 was laid over until after payment for debentures is made. An account of A. W. Connor and Co. for \$500 and interest for engineering fees some years ago, was tabled, as Clerk had written James Proctor and Redfern regarding this. Accounts totalling \$544.17 presented by Finance Com. were passed.

W. S. Hunter, Chairman of Board of Works, reported investigating the cause for water of creek at corner of Sadder and Albert Sts. being held, and flooding Miss Rose's property and roadside. He believed the cause Sadder St. was too high, and if lowered six inches would drain off the water and relieve the situation.

J. P. Smith, Chairman of Fire and Light Com., reported that Fire Brigade should have two gas masks, Palmite extinguishers and nozzles that would shut off for hose. Couns. Whitmore and Stonehouse urged the advantage of gas masks and on mo

### One Cattle Shipment Realized Over \$3200

Frank Murdock of Bentinck sends best shipment into Stock Yards.

Among outstanding arrivals at the Union Stock Yards, West Toronto, last week, were 20 steers shipped to the United Farmers' Co-operative Company, Limited, by Frank R. Murdock, Bentinck, the owner. The shipment averaged 1,405 lbs. per head and was sold to the Harris Abattoir at \$11.50, making a total of \$3,225.20, or an average of \$161.26 per head.

It was the best shipment received that day and Mr Murdock was asked to give a report, relating how he raised such fine stock on a 100 acre farm. He purchased only \$200 worth of feed for them, outside of what was home grown. Mr Murdock also shipped a load of hogs last week which realized \$245 and has more coming along.

There's quite a bit of work about it, but the farmer who goes in for stock-raising on a larger than average scale, has much greater opportunities of making farming a paying business.
