THE ROLL CALL

MRS. (REV.) JOHN LITTLE

We regret to record the death of Mrs. (Rev.) John Little, in Guelph Hospital, on Monday evening of this week, after an illness of some duration. The past ten days she has been a patient in the hospital, a sufferer from a heart and dropsical affection. Deceased was about 70 years of age.

Previous to her marriage to Mr. Little over 50 years ago, Mrs Little was a resident of Eramosa, her maiden name being Susan McFarlane. She faithfully fulfilled the marriage vow and has ever been the sympathetic supporter and prep to her husband in his long years of ministerial work. Her memory will long remain green. Chatsworth, Dornoch and Rocky Saugeen, Holstein and Fairbairn, Morningside, Rockwood and Conn, have all come under the sphere of her influence in her husband's pastorates and much of his success, was due to the untiring devotion of his late wife. It was the intention of Rev. Mr Little to retire from the active ministry this fall and remove from Conn to Rockwood, where his residence was still retained. The family comprise one son, John, at Rockwood and three daughters, Miss Jennie, at home; Mrs. Mrs D. Bell, Guelph; Myrtle, Mrs. Robinson, Toronto.

The funeral will be held on Thursday afternoon from her late residence at Rockwood.
In common with a host of friends in Durham and neighborhood, the Review extends sympathy to Rev Mr. Little in his dark hour.

ARCHIBALD LYONS MCKENZIE

Saturday noon last, at his home in Buffalo, Archibald Lyons McKenzie, was found dead in his chair in bedroom by friends. It is not known how long the spirit of life had fled, but it is judged since the night previous, as deceased was in night attire. He has been in poor health for some time from hardening of the arteries, though always going around. On Sunday, May 11th, he motored north to Durham to visit his sister and grandchildren here, and only Tuesday last a letter from him to his sister, told of another anticipated visit to his old home.

The late Mr McKenzie was the only son of Postmaster Archibald McKenzie, but in early years left Durham. He returned home at intervals, but it is now some 35 years since he left the town permanently. 30 years ago, his wife, formerly Hannah Skelton, passed away, leaving him with three young daughters, Marjorie (Mrs Hazel); Marion, (Mrs Blanchard), both of Buffalo; Edith, (Mrs W. R. McGowan), who passed away four and a half years ago. The three daughters were brought up by their aunt, Miss Laura, of town, and in their teens left to take up home with their father. Deceased was 60 years of age.

The body was brought to Durham by motor Tuesday and interment made from his sister's home to Durham cemetery the same afternoon, and now lies beside his wife. Rev. J. T. Priest conducted services at the house and grave, the pall bearers being J. J. Smith, Jas MacLachlan, Allan McFarlane, Robt Hughes, Jno. McGowan, Thos Little, the latter a cousin from near Walkerton.
He is survived by two sisters, Mrs Van Wie (Edith) of Toronto and Miss Laura at home.
