Early Thursday morning last, June 12th, at the home of her daughter, Mrs James Mather of town, the spirit of Mrs William Hunter passed to a fairer world, leaving behind memories of a brave and valiant heart and the kindest neighbor or friend one might wish. In August of 1928, with her granddaughter, Edith Hunter of Egremont, she was the victim of an accident at Barber's Corners, when the car her granddaughter was driving collided with a Hamilton car. From the Hamilton homestead she was married 56 years ago this month to William Hunter, and who predeceased her eight years ago February last.

To the time of her removal to Durham two years ago, her married life was spent in the one home farm and it is a tribute to the rugged character of deceased that the section of No. 12, Egremont to-day, rise up and call her blessed. In days of health she was a pillar of Amos Church, Dromore, being active in Sunday School and Missionary work. A few years ago the local W.M.S. of Amos Church, presented Mrs Hunter with a Life Membership Certificate in their Society as an appreciation of what she had done in the cause of Missions.

To mourn her passing are two sons and two daughters: Andrew of Holstein; Reeve W. H. Hunter of No. 12 section; Nellie, Mrs Jas. Mather, Durham; Agnes, Mrs David Gilmour, Burgessville.
