### Official figures give Miss Macphail 243 Majority

At the official count held Monday by Ret'g Officer M. E. Murray, Miss Macphail's majority was fixed at 243. This is unofficial for four polls, for which returns have not yet been received, but the figures he has heard for these polls (No. 4 Holland, No. 3 Proton, No. 3 Normanby, and No. 1 Halover in part) he has been assured are correct.

The figures published last week were almost all correct, except for Sullivan township, where majority was 311 instead of 387 as first reported. This was practically the only change.

### CONQUEST OF THE AIR

No little excitement has been stirred at Montreal and throughout Canada by the arrival of the R-100, the biggest airship to cross the Atlantic so far. To leave Cardington, England and 79 hours later to tie up in Montreal is something of a record. ### MISS MACPHAIL'S VICTORY

(Editorial in St. Thomas Times-Journal) One of the most popular wins of the election campaign just closed was that of Miss Agnes Macphail, U.F.O., who was re-elected in Southeast Grey. Her victory over a strong Conservative candidate speaks well for the confidence which her constituents have in her ability to represent them efficiently in Parliament. Since 1921 Miss Macphail has been a member of the House and on three occasions her constituents have had an opportunity

to elect somebody else were they dissatisfied with her stewardship. But the fact that in the general elections of 1925, 1928 and 1930 they re-elected her shows unmistakably that they appreciate her services.

In the nine years that she has sat in the seats of the mighty at Ottawa she has developed into an astute parliamentarian, well able to hold her own in debate with the best of her fellow-members.

We have not always agreed with her views, notably those on military training, but we have always admired her sincerity, her alertness, her ability, her fearlessness and her independence. Few male members can equal her record in taking pains to be a faithful and efficient representative. Miss Macphail has come to occupy a prominent place in Parliament, and her defeat, which seems a long way off, would be like the passing of an institution.

The fact that Miss Macphail will continue to be the only woman member is not the fault of her sisters. Eight of them sought election in the recent campaign, and their defeat indicates that the majority of the electors are of the opinion that politics, so far at least as parliamentary representation is concerned, is a man's world.

Of course, the majority of those defeated on Monday were third candidates running in constituencies strongly opposed to policies they supported. Women candidates are like that. Men candidates are like that. In this respect, that the ability of extending the home market for Ontario fruit and other products, He is in fact already planning a campaign to give active expression to the slogan "Eat more Ontario Farm Products." It is long overdue and what is true of Ontario is largely true of other provinces in Eastern Canada in many lines of farm products.

Meaford Mirror: Its a mighty hard election when Agnes Macphail can get only some 300 majority in South East Grey.

With some of the best of the Liberal party re-elected and a few good new men, the opposition at Ottawa will be great in debating strength.

It is not every Opposition leader that accends the seats of the mighty in three short years. Hon R. E. Bennett was appointed to that position at the famous Winnipeg Conservative Convention in 1927. Hon. Arthur Meighen never became premier by the gift of the people and Hon R. L. Borden had years of weary waiting.

### WHY NOT EAT OUR OWN APPLES?

(Ontario Farmer) The mystery of why apples grown thirty or forty miles away cost the consumer in the large centres as much as apples grown in California, while the grower gets less than the cost of producing them, is being investigated by the Commissioner of Agricultural Economics at Ottawa and his staff.

At least this question will no doubt be included in the investigation now being made, which in the words of the Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Dr Grisdale, includes: "All phases of the apple industry; production, marketing, storage, transportation, consumer demand and dealer, and consumer requirements as to quality, grade, size of package, methods of sale, etc." The survey is to cover all the leading apple growing sections in the Dominion and it is estimated will take at least a year.

One cause of the present spread between retail and orchard prices, we believe, is the overlapping in the marketing of Canadian apples. It looks like poor economy for instance for British Columbia apples to come clear across the prairies to sell in Ontario cities when ample supplies are produced here, enough to meet local consumption and still leave a surplus for export. Mr Fairburn, Dep. Minister of Agriculture for Ontario, is a firm believer in the possibility of extending the home market for Ontario fruit and other products.

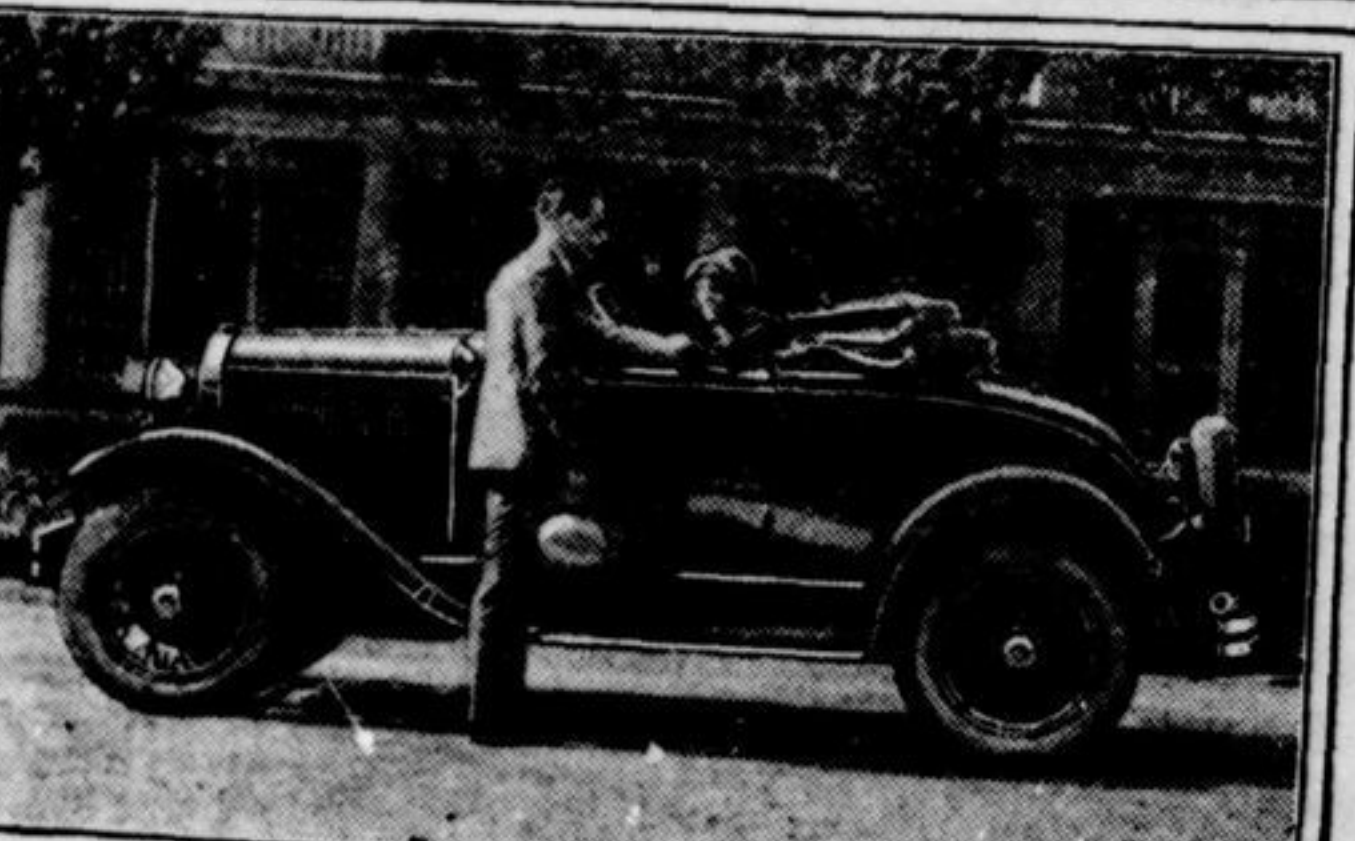
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### Ford Convertible Cabriolet
