In every single case without exception, where we went for a voter, the excuse was "Oh, I am so busy, she'll not miss my vote; she's going in any way." When ten or twelve hundred look at it in that light Miss Macphail's victory is very notable. After our Conservative friends have made two or three more unsuccessful attempts to defeat her, they will possibly get a little consolation out of that memorable election of 1930 when they almost succeeded in defeating her by 80-0-0 300 votes—the nearest they will ever get again, we predict.


