Tuesday evening being the twelfth anniversary of the signing of the Armistice, was the occasion for many returned soldier reunions throughout the country and the Red Cross rooms over McLachlan's store was one of them. The ladies of the Red Cross Society, assisted by the I.O.G.E. and Women's Institute, donated the tables and approximately 70 returned soldiers sat down and did justice to an excellent chicken supper.

Duffield proposing the toast to 'Our Fallen Comrades', which was responded to by two minutes silence. The toast to 'Absent Friends' was proposed by C. H.
