Hamburg Steak Dinner.

One pound hamburg steak fried in butter and not made in cakes. To the meat I add 1 large onion and 2 small cloves of garlic, salt and pepper. At the same time I cook 1/2 package of spaghetti or marcaroni in salted

water. When done, I add to the meat and put in a few tiny thin slices of the stems of lettuce if I have it or minced lettuce leaves. Cook together perhaps 5 minutes, then add % can of tomatoes (10-cent size). Use more or less as desired. Serve as soon as it starts to boil again or set way back on the stove. I cook this in 20-to 30 minutes and serve usually with hot biscuits.
