BUY FARM LANDS NOW. (Forest Standard) One of the safest rules in buying stocks, bonds or anything else is to buy when everyone wants to sell and to sell when everyone wants to buy. It is not safe to wait for the peak of the low spot in the market. The time to have sold farm land was back in 1920 when prices were soaring high. Speculators were jacking up the prices and the boom craze went to the people's heads. Following the same reason this is the best time to buy a farm if you intend to farm. The depression has lowered the price of produce and with it has brought down farm land values. This is bound to be a temporary condition. When prices start their upward march the cost of the acres will bound with them. Five years from now people are going to look back and chide themselves for not investing in farm lands when they were in the price valleys.
