**WHY SHOULD BIRTHS BE REGISTERED?**

When the baby is born, the law requires that he event be properly and formally recorded through registration of the birth. The law should be obeyed, not because it is the law but because it is in the interest of the new baby to have a birth certificate. Failure to register the child's birth may cause him considerable inconvenience later on. The child may, in future years, require his birth certificate for any of the following reasons:

1. Proof that he was born in Canada, that he has a right to a passport as a Canadian citizen for travel outside the country.
2. Proof of age as a right to enter and leave school, as evidence that he is old enough to go to work, or to have the right to vote, or for enlistment in the army. Most insurance companies require proof of age before claims can be settled.
3. To establish identity to prove that he is the son of his parents and that as such he has the right to inherit.

There are many more reasons, such as proof of age before securing a motor vehicle driver's license, to establish eligibility for old age pensions. Enough have been mentioned however, to prove conclusively that it is most desirable for the baby that his birth be registered. A moral and legal obligation rests upon parents to see that the birth of their child is properly registered.


