Echo of Auto Crash

Campbell Grant of Walkerton appeared for Geddes in the action, while lawyer Bowly of Hamilton, was present for the defendant in the suit.

Visiting brethren and Sisters from Neighboring Centres march with local Organizations.—Rev. W. H. Smith Delivers a Thoughtful Sermon.

The brethren of Grey Lodge, I. O. O. F., together with the new Rebekah Lodge and a number of visiting brethren worshipped in a body in Knox United Church Sunday evening, where they enjoyed a powerful discourse from the pastor, Rev. W. H. Smith, on links in human life. Brethren were present from Hanover, Mr Forest and Palmerston, and also several lodges from Hanover Rebekah Lodge. In all, over a hundred were in the parade and filled the centre pews far back, the largest attendance of the lodge at any service held.

The pastor spoke upon the three well-known links of Oddfellowship—Friendship, Love and Truth. All three are fundamental to human life,—they bind men into a brotherhood and make them a great influence in our community and national life.

Links are one of the greatest symbols in human life. Cars of trains are bound together by links. Nothing in human life is worth while without links—they are the most important thing of life. It was the desire of different communities in Canada to be linked together and to make the economic as well as social life of Canada one. The C.P.R. was built to link East and West and other railways as links made possible the great development of our nation.

The soul of Jonathan was knit to the soul of David by a link no man could see. They were a secret society of two, bound by the covenant of love into one. Jonathan was a friend closer than any brother or sister—who would give everything for him. This knitting was the ideal of friendship, it increases power in human life, for two can do much more than one. Our Lord sent men out in pairs to serve Him and His Kingdom.

In the world one man is a nobody at the mercy of everyone. Man has learned that in union there is power to increase influence, strength and prosperity of each one. If this is the secret of success in big business.

Mrs Giles reported the total receipts for the year as \$268.48 and the expenditures \$248.48, which included a payment on the piano placed in Town Hall, assistance on a hospital bill, hales sent to the north, baskets of Christmas cheer, a contribution to the Tobemory doctor and local relief.

Mrs C. Kinnee contributed an interesting paper "The life story of the mecha and butterflies of our orchards and gardens."

"Canadians too Lazy to Ride Bicycles"

In the course of his talk at Queen St. Church Tuesday, Dr Groves, Ferguson, tells of above Answer by a Frenchman to the Doctor.—Splendid Program by Fergus Talent.—Banquet at close in church basement.

The concert in Queen St. United Church Tuesday evening by Fergus Talent, was something Durham does not hear very often; in that talented members of Melville United Church choir, its pastor, Rev G. A. McDonald and the famous surgeon, Dr. Groves, all of that town, took part. It is delightful to think that a man of Dr Groves' years—83—is able to come to a sister town and speak of his travels abroad last summer. How many men of to-day at that age would venture on such an expedition? In his travels on the continent, he visited several countries, England, Holland, Belgium, Germany Switzerland, France, and gave his most vivid impressions of each. The Passion Play of Oberammergau was a wonderful reality to him and the scenes depicted will be ever before him. Dr Groves noted the absence of motors to the percentage Canada uses them. In place they use bicycles and questioning a Frenchman why this is, he got the answer, "Canadians are too lazy to ride bicycles."

The musical numbers were all of a high order and consisted of piano solos by Mrs Collins, Walkerton; tenor solo, Mr Johnston; cello solos, Mr. McGrueher; duets, Mrs M. J. Beatty and Mrs Grieve; solo, Mrs Grieve; violin solo, Miss Ellen Beatty.

Rev. G. A. McDonald on arising, had kind words for Dr Groves and members of his choir in front of him. His choir are most faithful in their duties and that Fergus has musical talent is evident, when he told his audience that there is a waiting list for entry into his choir. He dwelt for a short time on the thought of the fertilizing influence of rivers. He instanced the effect of the mighty Nile in Africa upon that country and the Thames of England upon vegetation in Hampton Court's wonderful grape vine. He applied this to human life, showing what it was to give one's time and talents to church work and the fertilizing process it was in reaching others. We were then drinking of the water of life.

Rev. H. S. Fiddes opened and closed with prayer and a few kindly words of greeting to the visitors. At the close a banquet was served the visitors, when a toast list was arranged and responded to as follows:
