**ATTEMPTED TO AID RELATIVES IN RUSSIA**

The Arthur Enterprise-News recently published an article concerning a Mr Chaplin of that town, and formerly of Listowel, of his attempt to aid relatives in Russia. The Enterprise-News says:

"The experience of Mr Chaplin of Arthur in his effort to assist relatives in Russia who suffer hardships under the Communist rule is interesting. Mr Chaplin has a sister residing in Russia. He purchased groceries to the value of \$2.60, which he purposed sending her as a little gift. On the parcel he paid in postage and duties \$3.56. To his surprise he has

learned that the parcel was refused admittance by the Communist government until a tax equivalent to \$48 in Canadian money was paid. This, of course, was prohibitive and so the groceries have been returned to Arthur. The policy of the Communists in this particular are hard to understand.

"Mr Chaplin informs us that, according to advices which he received, conditions are not good in Russia. The Russian Five Year Plan which is a scheme to industrialize the whole country in five years, is working at present great hardship on the people, whatever may be the final outcome. His brother is employed in the cloth manufacturing business and receives a salary equivalent to \$65

per month in Canadian money. Of this amount he has every month to contribute to the five year plan \$30. It is not difficult to realize under such a policy which the Russian government is annually collecting to build and equip factories for Communism, by which within five years according to the original scheme, the Russians are to become independent of imported manufactured products. The cost of living, Mr Chaplin informed us, is very high. His Russian relatives pay as much as \$1 per pound for meat and as high as \$3 per pound for butter. The government is the great employer of labor and the more highly skilled the mechanical work performed the higher the scale of wages paid. The skilled mechanic seems, in Communism, to be regarded as the state's most valued citizen."
