Durham's Oldest Resident Passes Away Wednesday

Mrs. Robert Hill Almost a Centurian

To attain the age of 97 years is something that falls to few, but Mrs Robert Hill who passed away at the Hospital here at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, May 27. For the past week she has been an inmate of the Hospital but previous to that, during many weeks of suffering and weakness, her last days have been made easier by the ministrations of her grand daughter, Miss Margaret Speers and son William Hill. The late Mrs Hill has led a healthy, active and honored life and death has now come more in the light of a relief.

Mrs Hill who had been a resident of Glenelg Tp. for nearly 50 years, lived for that time south of town at Corktown hill. The past few years she has made her home on George St. in town, with son and grand daughter. She was born in Vaughan, Ontario, in 1836, she was married to Robert Hill, who died some 17 years ago. Being a millwright by trade, Mr Hill's work took him to many places and during the first years of their married life, the young couple resided at Orilla, Barrie, Stayner and Alliston, coming to Glenelg from the latter place in 1876. Members of the family are: Mrs. Speers, Caledon, who recently spent some time with her mother; John in Ohio; Mrs Colin McArthur, Glenelg; Robert, Neepawa, Man.; Wm., at home, here; Janet, Winnipeg and Peter in Durham.

Another feature in connection with Mrs Hill's history was the number of times she has had photos taken with members of the fourth generation, having posed on four occasions with members of the family line in succession.
