**OLD AGE PENSIONS A FARCE IN MANY RESPECTS**  
 (Walkerton Herald-Times)

That Old Age Pensions are more popular with the recipients than they are with the tax payers is becoming more and more evident as the years roll by and judging by reports of abuses in some other countries where parties are being added to the pension list in wholesale numbers, it makes pleasant reading to the already overburdened taxpayers of this country to learn that all at least, are not getting it in this zone.

A village in an adjoining county has so many pensioners on the list that in proportion to its population, nearly all who reach the age limit must be getting on the roll. Queer that there are so many needy since the Old Age Pensions' Act came in to force than was the case when the House of Refuge was practically the sole means of relieving the distress. How many of those in town now drawing Old Age Pensions would have gone to the Refuge if no such hand-out had been provided by the Government? Indigency has been cloaked apparently with a more congenial garb and what was considered more or less of a stigma against relatives, to allow their aged dependents to go "Over the Hills" to the Big Free Foodery, is now considered in the light of a claim that a person who has reached a certain age and by his thriftlessness or misfortune can make another person of the same age who has stinted himself and laid aside in his youth for his oncoming years, contribute to the keep of others, no matter how undeserving their past may have been. In other words the bunch that couldn't qualify for a pension here on Tuesday must have been found to have made more of a monetary success in life than those who got through, or probably they had produced offspring that were capable of financing the aged claimants. In other words there must have been a successful streak somewhere in the family circle or some other saving grace to warrant the Board in refusing to quarter them on the county.

While a few of the pensioners may have reached the state of aged penury through no fault of their own, yet when we consider that the thriftless of to-day will be the pensioners of to-morrow we can't enthuse over the lik that will be grabbing off the bulk of the Old Age toll in the sweet subsequently.

**GENERAL FARM SCHEDULES**  
 Recently sample copies of the General Farm Schedule, to be used in the forthcoming Census, has gone out from the Bureau of Statistics to every farmer in Canada.  
 It is particularly urged that the farmer study this form and fill in the answers to all questions relating to the farm which he operates. By doing this in advance of the visit of the enumerator in June, much time will be saved to the farmer himself, and generally the work of the Census will be much more efficient. Whole-hearted co-operation is solicited from everyone engaged in this basic industry, since the census is an invaluable asset to Governments and Agricultural organizations in planning a comprehensive agricultural policy.  
 Every employee engaged in census work is sworn to secrecy and the information given to the enumerator will be used only in the preparation of statistical tables.
