On Sunday morning last, the above lady passed to her reward, becoming acutely ill, about 15 minutes usual, about 9 a. m., had put on her shoes and stockings at her bedside, when her daughter, Mrs. Moran heard her make a somewhat strange noise. The doctor was hastily summoned, but was powerless to check the onsets of Death, her lungs filling up in a few moments. The years spent on the homestead on con 19, Egremont, were busy ones for deceased, rearing a family of three sons and three daughters, as well as mothering Mr. Reid's first family, who all today pay a tribute of love and respect to her. An unusual occurrence is the fact, that the children of the first family and the six of her own family are all living and well today—fourteen in all. The memories of her neighborliness and kindly qualities on farm and elsewhere, are cherished by her family and friends. The table may have been meagre at times but true hospitality was never lacking. Her life was one of service for others and her children rise up and call her blessed.

With her late husband and remaining family, deceased moved to Durham ten years ago to the home on Lambton St. East, and while she has gone out little, she was always pleased to welcome old friends. Her family are: Robert M. and Charles R. Webb, Sask.; George R. Regina; Grace, Mrs. Will Johnston, St. Marys; Blanche, Mrs. Jack Ray, Dornoch; Jessie, Mrs. W. J. Moran, Durham, with whom she has made her home, and who saw to her comfort. There are 36 grand children and 4 great grandchildren.

The funeral was held today, Wednesday, to Maplewood cemetery, services being conducted by her pastor, Rev. W. H. Smith of Knox United Church, Durham.

## Durham Tied 2nd Round defeating Blair here 7-5

Play-off Friday Night at 8.30 under Floodlights at Alma.

Durham's O. A. S. A. ball team came back strong here on Tuesday night, winning from Blair 7-5, after losing first game in Blair 14-0 to 6 last week. This ties up the second round O.A.S.A. semi-finals and the play off to determine the winner will take place on Alma's flood light diamond at 8.30 on Friday night this week.

Blair arrived in one large truckload, players and fans. They used the same line-up as vanquished Durham at home. Durham shifted their line-up somewhat, putting Reno D'Alvise in the box with McDonald catching. Murdoch was moved in to corner 2nd base, W. Wilson and C. McGirr looked after right field, and Hamlin covered 1st base. The shake up brought results, at any rate, and a large crowd were delighted that Durham was able to triumph over the aggressive Southerners.

In the main, Durham can thank the two pitchers for their success. Both were lacking in control, but D'Alvise had the more baffling delivery and though he issued 11 walks to Blair Hornets, V. Debruske handed Durham 17 free trips to first and his for 6 of them blossomed into runs. D'Alvise had the same number of strike-outs—11, and was going strong at the close, striking out the side in the 8th—the final frame.

Hits were very scarce, Durham securing only 3 safeties and Blair 2. Two of Durham's came opportunely, but in 3 of their 7 innings, Durham had bases loaded and left there. Twice the last batter struck out and once flied out.

D'Alvise easily retired Blair in 1st, but in 2nd, 4 walks forced in 1 run. In 3rd and 4th they were blanked, while Durham counted 4 in 4th on 3 walks interspersed with timely two-baggers by D'Alvise and Elvidge. The Hornets came back strong in 5th, with 3 runs and nary a hit. 5 walks were handed to them and that tied it up, 4-4. Not to be outdone in generosity Debruske in Durham's 5th handed the locals 6 walks and 3 more Durham runs crossed the plate, all after two were out. The Hornets were stingier thereafter, till the 8th, when their final tally resulted from a walk, Durham lost a bright chance to pile up the score in the 6th, when McGirr singled but was caught off 1st after Bradley's neat catch of Black's fly. 3 walks followed but Elvidge couldn't connect.
