NEW LEGISLATION FOR PASSING MIDDLE SCHOOL EXAMS.

Teachers' certificates will be sufficient to give students in Middle Schools of Ontario promotion, in place of departmental examinations, according to new regulations which have been approved by Hon. G. S. Henry, Premier of the Province and Minister of Education. This measure will be effective for the school year 1931-32.

The new scheme will mean a saving to the Province of more than \$32,000 in salaries of associate examiners, and to parents of pupils of \$35,000, said Premier Henry. Candidates for examination at present are required to pay one dollar for every paper they write.
