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Miss Macphail's Weekly Letter to the Review

On the 1st day of June in a crowded House, the Prime Minister, the Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, in his capacity as Financed Minister, brought down the budget. In ten years we have now heard Fielding, Robb, Dunning and Bennett bring down budgets. This last was by far the most lengthy: it set forth the financial position of Canada in a most comprehensive way. Whether or not it was, as claimed, "The first time the House had ever a real Budget" is a matter of opinion. It was, as is usual, a written brief, but at intervals Mr. Bennett would leave the text of the manuscript and berate the Opposition for its misdeeds.

The total outgo for the year dealt with was roughly \$423,000,000. Total revenue for the same period was \$349,000,000, leaving a deficit of over \$80,000,000. In preparing for the year to come, Mr. Bennett estimated the total expenditure at \$420,000,000 and the total revenue, on the basis of this year's collection at \$325,000,000, leaving a gap of \$105,000,000. As Finance Minister he has imposed new taxation which he believes will bring him in \$78,000,000 additional revenue, which will leave a deficit next year of \$27,000,000. Income tax has been increased on incomes from \$3,500 to \$25,000. Yet an income of \$200,000 is less than before, —\$5,000 less. On an income of \$500,000 the new income tax is \$41,000 less than before. The sales tax is increased from 1 per cent to 4 per cent and an excise tax of 1 per cent has been placed on all goods, whether durable or free. The 3c postage stamp has come back again. The postage on newspapers with a circulation of more than 10,000 is increased from 1c a pound to 15c, and a tax of 15c a pound has been placed on all foreign magazines and periodicals entering Canada: religious, educational and scientific magazines to be exempted by Order-in-Council. The income tax on corporations has been increased from 8 per cent to 10 per cent and a 2c excise stamp goes on all cheques. Foreigners with investments in Canada pay a 2 per cent tax on all dividends.

The country is to pay 5c a bushel of the freight charges on wheat exported and a dollar a ton on wheat exported. Maritime coal used in Canada is to pay a duty of 40c a ton on foreign coal and 75c on soft coal is im-

posed. A duty of 5c a pound on bulk tea coming from the United Kingdom and 10c a pound from tea from other countries is imposed. The duty on higher priced automobiles is raised and changes made in 200 tariff items. Unemployment was never mentioned.

Hon. Col. Ralston as financial critic of the Liberal party, replied to Mr. Bennett. While he criticized rather severely Gov't policy, he did so in teleant temper and left the impression on the House that he was seeking to be fair. He urged the Prime Minister to appoint a Minister of Finance, maintaining it was unfair to the country for Mr. Bennett to attempt to fill both offices. He termed the Budget a rich man's budget. "Four-fifths of the total taxation will be paid by the mass of the people, the very day citizens, not by the rich but by most of them who are affected by having restricted markets," Mr. Ralston charged the Gov. with having failed to keep its promises regarding the curing of unemployment. H. H. Stevens, Min. of Trade and Commerce, followed and he accused the Liberals of having utterly failed to keep their promises in their nine years of office. Mr. Heaps, representing Labor, said "the budget contains something for the manufacturer, it contains something for the millionaire but there is nothing for the working-man. This has been termed a rich man's budget—I would term it a millionaire's and a manufacturer's budget."

Mr. G. G. Cote, the first speaker for agriculture, referring to the deficit said that it was due to a reduction in trade and in incomes, for which low prices of commodities was responsible. Low prices of commodities are caused by too little currency in circulation rather than by over-production. If people could exchange surplus for surplus, over production would be unheard of. Mr. Cote said the only alternative is to abandon the gold basis of currency, as has been done in Australia, Argentina and other South American countries. Foreign currency would then be at a premium in Canada and the selling price of all our exports would be increased. The debate is likely to continue for some time.

Tobermory, the Coming Tourist Centre of Bruce

few copies are seen. This so-called bush skirts the roadside to the extreme edge and when you add to this the charm (?) of coasting over "forty hills" and a circuitous route at the same time, you are not inclined to become sleepy. To explain the sensation as nearly as we can, it has all the earmarks of a roller-coaster we try out at the midway.

Settlements are very few between Lion's Head and the "Tub" and it is rather a grand hunting paradise for the sportsman.

The "Tub," as Tobermory is popularly called, including a settlement a mile below the village, carries a population of about 450 people. None of them are wealthy, but all are happy and contented, and that you can read on their countenances. We had occasion to meet with Mr and Mrs. Hopkins, recently returned from Durham environs, where they celebrated their golden wedding in company with her brother, Mr John Cuff and Mrs Cuff. They are great grandparents and judging from their keen alertness and outlook on life, stand a good chance of seeing their great-grandchildren. Mr Hopkins is a pioneer of Tobermory, having come to that district in 1879 and now sur- rounds the "Tub" has a bottom of solid rock and to produce a garden, it was necessary for Mr Hopkins to draw sand and earth considerable distances as a "bottom" for his vegetables.

Fishing is the chief industry of the people and to visit the dock this is easily evident. Beautiful lake trout are the products of these waters and they are shipped to all sections of Ontario. The tourist business is rapidly expanding and lots are taken up all along the water front, chiefly by Americans. We are not "talking" when we say Tobermory's population will be trebled in five years time.

Through the kindness of Mr Will Craigie, son of Capt Craigie, and a native of the "Tub," we saw much that is of interest to the visitor: the government wireless station; the new Community Hall, the picturesque log library, financially abetted by a wealthy American, Mr Rodman, and owner of Cove Island. As librarian, they have a find in Mr. Grievies, a scholarly gentleman, native of Glasgow, who is full of his work and hobbies. The library contains over 950 volumes and must be a boon to the people of this remote district.

The Community Hall is an outcome of the enterprise of its citizens and this Tuesday, June 9, is being officially opened by Hon. T. Kennedy, Min. of Agriculture. It has a seating capacity of 400 people, commodious stage beautifully equipped and a large basement where banquets and indoor sports might be held. When we visited the building the long tables were in readiness but the cats, to entertain Mr Kennedy. We can almost guarantee that this Minister of the Crown will be taxed to his capacity—in other words too full for utterance.

A trip around the harbor in the motor launch was not the least enjoyable feature of the day. Tobermory has a wonderful natural harbor, lake vessels coming right to the pier. Within a foot of the pier, the depths are estimated from 25 to 40 feet. It has no beach for bathing purposes but you get this and more at Dunk's Bay, a few miles further south, on an inlet of Georgian Bay. It is one of the prettiest localities we have seen and the allurements of summer must be strong to the cottagers who enjoy the outlook at this point from their cottages.

In our workaday world we hear of clergyman, magistrates, doctors, etc. enjoying a respite from duties at such cottages. But who ever heard of a publisher enjoying such prosperity and respite from duties to pass and occupy one? Meantime we are thankful we had the privilege of viewing delightfully one of Nature's beauty spots and when our estate enables us to procure one of these modern summer luxuries, Dunk's Bay will occupy a favored place in our mind's eye. But this is enough for one trip.
