ONE TRAIN EACH WAY ONLY, AFTER JUNE 28
Authorative word has been received by Agent Spaulding here that the proposed reduction in C.N.R. train service referred to last week will be in effect next Monday. The morning train leaving Durham and night train in, are being cut off, thus leaving only the one train daily service each way—arriving here at 1.00 p.m. and the outgoing train leaving here at 2.35 as usual.

On Southampton and Kincardine lines, the service is also being cut in half. The service on these lines will be morning train out about 6.45 and noon train in. This provides better service for fish shipments from lake-port towns.

COUNTY RATE SAME AS LAST YEAR
Grey County Council last week set the County rate at 9 1/2 mills, the same rate as in 1930, and passed a by-law, by vote of 26 to 11, authorizing issue of 20 4 1/2 per cent debentures for \$150,000 which will pay for paving work to be done this year in Meaford, Flesherton and Markdale. Bridges will also be built on Co. Road on 16th con, Egremont, but no other construction work proceeded with. No new machinery will be bought by the County this year. One train each way after June 28

Rev. Geo. A. Little, Knox Anniversary Speaker

Large Audiences Gather Sunday and hear two Powerful Discourses

There was a "Little" by name, but not by qualities of physique or outlook, in Knox Church pulpit, Durham for the Anniversary Services on Sunday last. Powerful in frame, he proved equally powerful in driving home divine truths, and the large audience of both morning and evening that heard this speaker, would find here more of him. The church may have an admirable administrator in him, as Editor of the United Church Sunday School Publications,—some 30 of them in all,—but they have lost to the pulpit his powers of logic and eloquence. He is yet a comparatively young man and his work to the church is felt through his writings and oversight of the publications, which extend from coast to coast.

The pastor and congregation of Queen St. gave way their evening service and fraternized with Knox congregation, which was a graceful act.

The choir were strong numerically and at both services, under the guidance of Miss M. L. Hunter, rendered fine anthems. The morning anthem contained an obligato and solo, rendered by Mr C. Graff. There was also a male quartette at the morning service and a duet "Love Divine" by Mr Graff and Miss Blyth at the evening service. Beautiful flowers graced the pulpit and these won the admiration of the speaker of the day.

At the morning service, Rev. Mr. Little took his text from John 4:37, 38: "And herein is that saying true, one sower and another reapeth" etc. Never were these words so exemplified as they are to-day: 101 years ago the publications of the church commenced in a small way, with 2000 of a circulation; now they reach the million figure: flowers are a product of the patient horticulturist, it taking years to cultivate the beautiful bloom we have to-day. Edgar Guest sums it up in a package of seed, as a "Miracle for a Dime." Organ music is a steady development from the days of reed instruments: what Michael Faraday evolved in generating power from simple experiments, leads to present development in Canada of 60,000,000 horse power: 151 years ago Robert Raikes organized a few streeturchins on Sunday, to hear more of Christ, and now to him memory stands a monument in Queen's Park, Toronto, for his notable contribution to the work of the Sunday School.

The speaker claimed we are the heirs of all the ages in every phase and department of life: who would be a sacrificial student of Christian religion, if such lives could be produced? We should regard our life as a heritage, debtors to the past and trustees of the future.

Evening Service
The evening service drew no text from the speaker, but "The Church" as an agency for moral righteousness in the land, made a wonderful background for his remarks. The aim of the church, according to an educated native of India, was to "Get, Grow and Give." From these three verbs, Rev. Mr Little developed a strong wall of protection for ourselves and the church. We "get" from the church the knowledge of the world's greatest book, the Bible and a share in the world's great crusade, a skill in worship and a friendship that is alike to no other friendship.

How do we Grow? (1) From study and from this idea the speaker stated that Canada was not the land of culture it should be. Religion is more a condition of the mind and we were not steeping it in the deeper truths: (2) Play; (3) Self Expression which should lead every person to seek opportunities as they arise to develop this trait: (4) Training in Citizenship.

What do we give the Church? Money, Time, Service and finally ourselves. It is easy to be a minimum Christian, but being a maximum Christian gives the only satisfactory results for the church worker. It takes two to make a Christian and one of them must be Christ.

THE ROLL CALL

MRS FLORA CAMPBELL

A patient invalid for the past four years, death came as a release on Friday last, to Mrs. Flora Campbell, widow of the late George Campbell, formerly of Aberdeen. During her long illness she has been most devotedly cared for by her daughter, Mrs John Morrison, with whom she resided in Durham the last ten years.

She was born in May 1844, in Islay, Scotland, thus being in her 88th year. Her maiden name was Flora Gilchrist. When ten years of age, the family removed to Canada and Flora lived for a time at her uncle's, near Brampton, thence removing with her parents to Keady, Sullivan Tp., where they took up farming. Here she grew to young womanhood, and previous to her marriage, kept house for her brothers in Bruce Co. for a few months.

In January 1870, she was wedded to George Campbell and they took up farming at Aberdeen and for forty three years here, they enjoyed a comfortable home and reared a family of three daughters and five sons. In the spring of 1913 the family having to reside with their daughter, Mrs John Morrison in Durham, and that fall her husband passed away. The following eight years, Mrs. Campbell spent in Western States and Canada, among her sons and daughters, returning to live with Mrs Morrison here. In 1927, she suffered an unfortunate fall, breaking her hip. Since then while the injury healed, she has been bedfast and helpless, tenderly cared for by her daughter and son-in-law and Miss Julia McLean, for some months requiring constant attention night and day.

The deceased was the last of a family of twelve children, five boys and seven girls. Of her family of eight, one daughter, Mrs Donald Morrison (Margaret) died a few years ago. Surviving her are Mrs J. Morrison (Mary), Durham; Peter Campbell of Saskatchewan; Mrs. Wm. Ledingham (Isabel) of Vancouver; N.E. of Westhope, N. Dak.; George, of Minot, N. Dak.; Dugald, Devil's Lake, N. Dak.; Donald of Akron, Mich. All have been back to Durham to visit their mother during her period of invalidism. Seventeen grandchildren and one great grandchild also survive.

Of Highland Scotch nationality, the late Mrs Campbell was the soul of hospitality, a loyal helpmate to her husband and a devoted mother to a family who revere her for her Christian character and training given them. In the community she was held in the highest regard as a true neighbor and friend.

The funeral held on Monday afternoon was very largely attended, interment being made in Durham cemetery. Rev B. D. Armstrong conducted the service, assisted by Rev. John Little of Rockwood, her former pastor at Rocky Sausage, and Rev. W. H. Smith. The pall bearers were Messrs Don Gilchrist of Tara, Neil McArthur, Owen Sound; Wm Smith, Duncan McLean, Lechlan McLean, Chas. Moffat.

Many friends came from a distance to pay a final tribute of love and respect: these were Rev.
