Priest gave an address on the early days of the Baptist Church in Ontario and Quebec. The first churches were opened in 1776 at Beamsville, in 1798 at Haldimand. In 1782, the Loyalists came over from United States and the Hallowell Church was opened in 1795 in Prince Edward County and in 1796 the Caldwell Manor, Quebec, was opened. The first church in Montreal was opened in 1830 and in Toronto in 1829. In 1850, a summary of the Baptist Churches in Ontario and Quebec was made and there was than 200 churches with a membership of 10,000. In 1851, the first Baptist Missionary Convention was organized in Western Ontario and in 1858 the convention in Western Canada was organized. The amalgamation took place in 1888. There was a good crowd present to hear this splendid address. Miss Eva Redford presided. W. Erwin, Jr. read the scripture lesson and Mrs. Thelma Bell was organist.

## Hanover School Won Field Day Honors

Had fine weather prevailed, the annual Track and Athletic Meet of Grey and Bruce Inter-scholastic Association, or in brief, High Schools Field Day, held on Durham Fair Grounds, would have been a pronounced success last Friday. As it was, the day could scarcely have been more disagreeable, and only a small crowd, outside of the students, faced the showers to witness the keen competition in the various events.

Some heavy showers fell both in forenoon and afternoon while sports were in progress, the afternoon grew chillier, and the cold breezes were a decided discomfort to all, especially to the competing lightly-clad athletes. Nevertheless the whole program was run off, rain or shine as advertised, but principally rain.

Six High Schools had entered their best athletes of both sexes—185 in all. These were Walkerton, Warton, Hanover, Chesley, Dundalk and Durham. As usual Hanover School captured the lion's share of the awards, winning the shield for most points and the two cups for highest in each boys' and girls' events. Durham girls gave Hanover a close chase for the cup, getting 24 points to Hanover's 27. Chesley gave Hanover the only serious competition in boys' events. Hanover finished first with 82 points, Durham 2nd with 43, Chesley 3rd with 39, Walkerton 18, Dundalk 14, Warton 3. Dundalk boys did not enter, not arriving until late, but their Senior girls made an excellent showing.
