Reminiscences of Holstein Community Circle

In October 1921, a Young People's organization was formed through the endeavors of Miss Davidson, now Mrs Merton Reid. A committee of three, the late Mr John Philp, Miss Davidson and Miss Cars were appointed to choose a name for the organization; thus we have our Community Circle. At first the membership was between thirty and forty, but it has grown, until last season the membership was one hundred and twenty. We used to have a summer session, but the last few years we have held meetings from Thanksgiving until Easter only. The purpose of the Circle was to help the young people to develop mentally, morally, physically and socially. We held many debates with outside young people's organizations in Durham, Varney, Dromore, Mount Forest and Conn, and also softball games in the summertime with the same places. In years gone by, many incidents have occurred, some of which we recall very clearly. Once when the Circle got on a concert in the Hall, we interviewed the Agricultural Society to see if we could not secure the Hall free. Personally each man favored it, but as a Society, the fee must be paid. The Treasurer, Mr Philp, a good friend of the Circle, said to pay when notified. The result is it has never been paid, as far as can be found out. Another member said to pay when you thrash. One night, so many came in late to the meeting, that the president, Miss B. Davidson, asked Burrows Smith, to give his topic the second time. When there was no special item of music on this particular evening, Miss Kerr prepared a solo on short notice, but was never called upon to give it. Another night, many of you will remember, Dr Mair and group, sang "Polly Wolly Doodle" repeatedly.

The yield of potatoes in Canada in 1930 totalled \$1,933,333 bushels, from 574,500 acres, at average yield of about 142 bushels per acre.
