## HEAVIER MOTOR TRUCK TAX WOULD BURDEN FARMERS

Railway corporations and railway employees have united in a demand for the imposition of heavier taxation on motor trucks. It is most unfair, they say, that trucks operating on highways, built by the public, should be allowed to compete with steam railways operating on their own right of way.

The statement on which the demand is based is not well founded. The highways on which trucks operate, the concrete highways, at least, have not been built by the "public."

They have been financed out of revenue collected from motor licenses and gasoline taxes. Less than eighteen million dollars were spent by the province on highway construction and maintenance in 1930. Well over 16 million dollars were collected by the provinces in license fees, gasoline, taxes, etc. When the fact is recalled that a large portion of the 18 millions spent was expended on construction that will last for years, it will be admitted that motor traffic as a whole is paying the whole cost of building or maintaining our modern highways.
