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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

To the Editor, Durham Review:

Dear Sir: Some time ago, there appeared in your paper, a letter trying to show that County expenditure had been increasing at an alarming rate, showing the expenditure for the 1st period 1925, 1926 and 1927, and comparing it with the next three years, 1928, 1929, 1930.

The total controllable net expenditure for 1925 was \$168,278.96; for 1930 it was \$128,301.92, or approximately \$40,000.00 less controllable expenditure in 1930 than in 1925, while the total non-controllable net expenditure for 1925 was \$18,302.28, and in 1930 it was \$26,270.87, or approximately \$8,000.00 more in 1930 than in 1925.

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WARDEN THE RIGHT MAN TO LAY OUT CORPSE

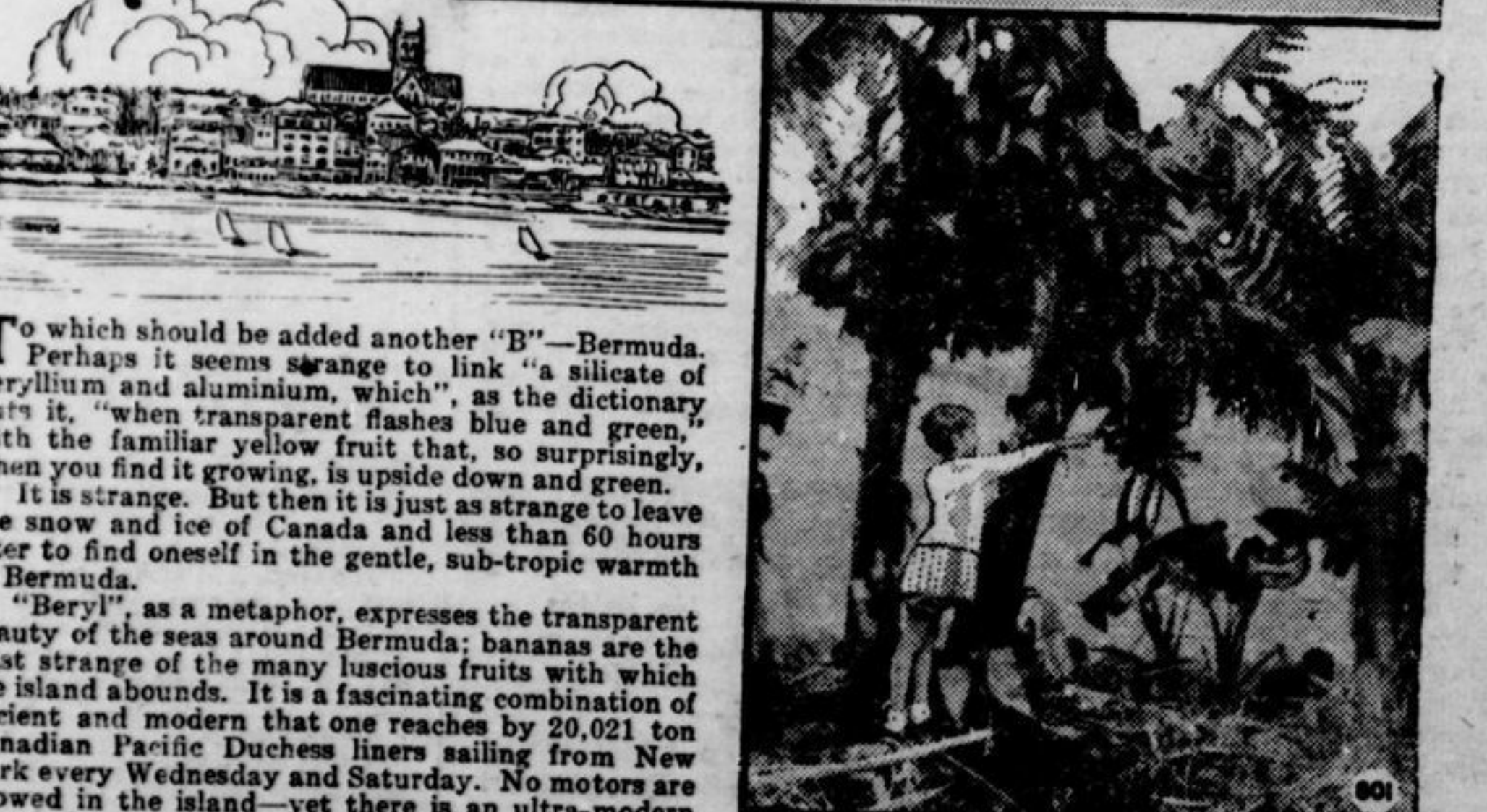
