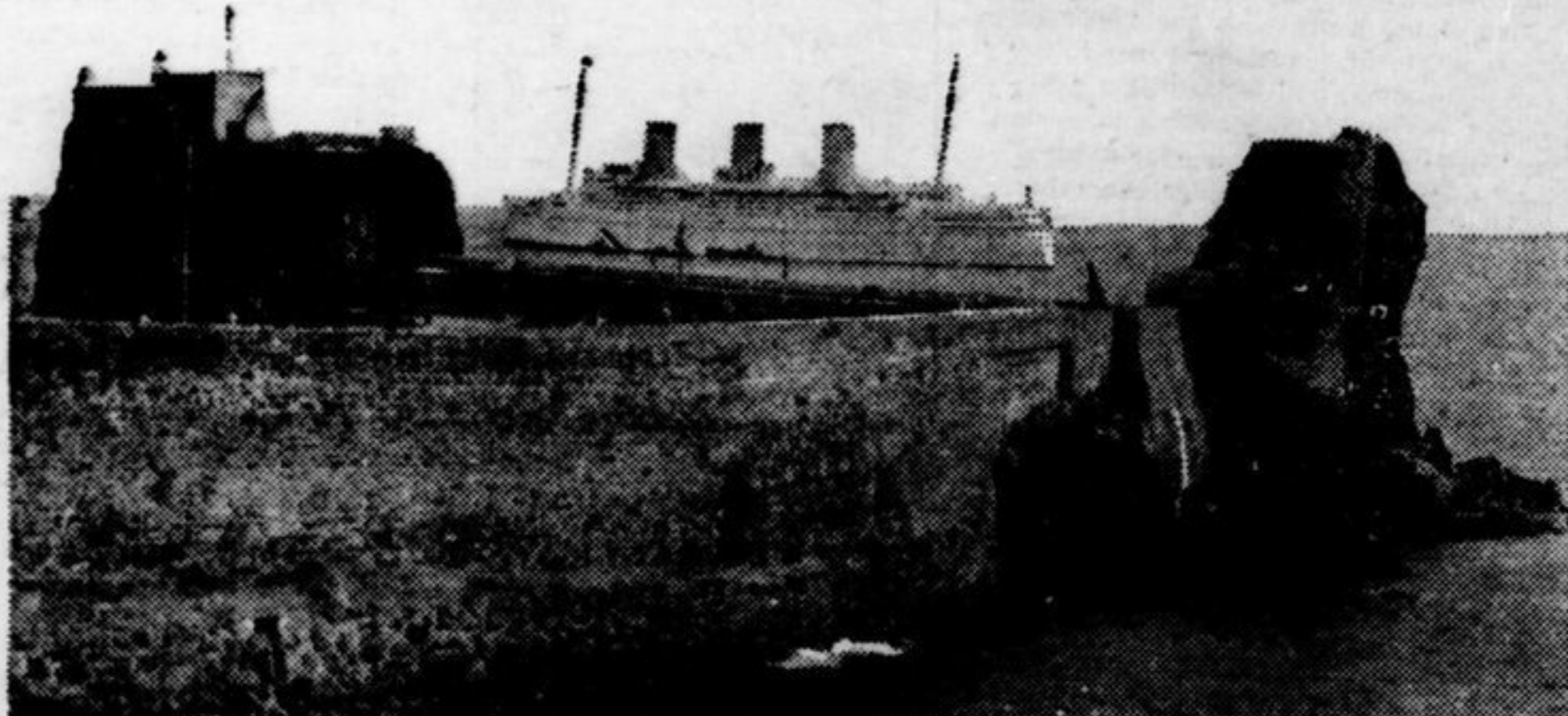

Mr Andrew Fulton and son Norman, Hampden, were welcome guests at the home of Mrs Fulton Sunday.

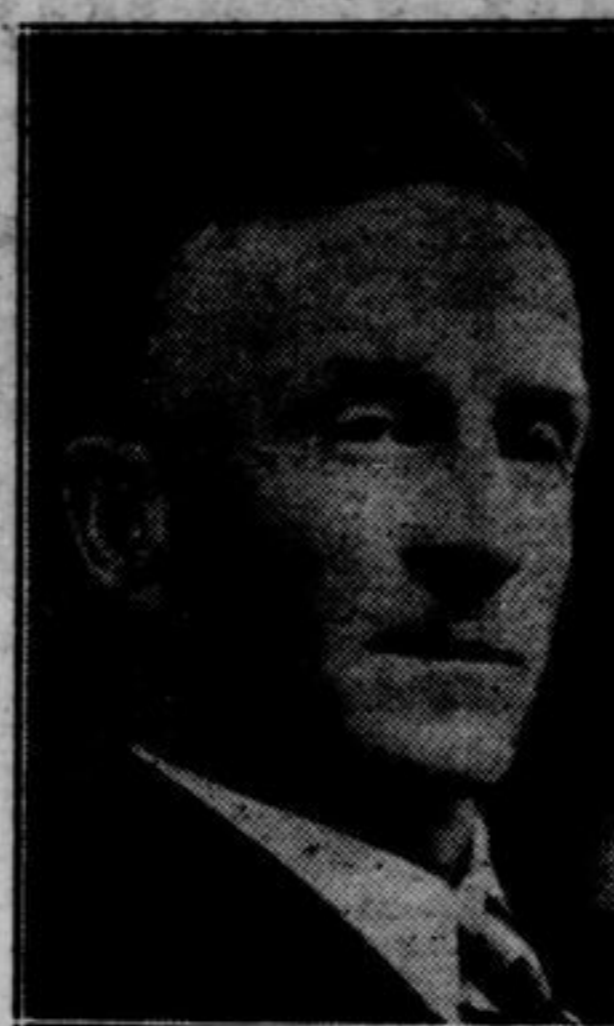
