WELLINGTON COUNTY APPROVES OF PAVING

Wellington County Council meeting in Guelph, went on record Saturday as favoring the Government proposal for the paving of the Guelph-Hespeler Highway this year. It had previously opposed the project for economic reasons. The Council also decided to urge the Provincial Department to pave the Arthur-Orange-streets paved.

Grey County Council at their June session, next week, will re-consider the question of paving in Grey, either for the completion of the 15 mile stretch from Rocky Saugen to Chatsworth on No. 6 Highway, or to extend the paving on north-westerly, from near Dundalk on No 10 Highway. Such an undertaking would be a big factor in relieving unemployment, and at the same time provide a permanent roadway, at a time when materials and labor are at low figures, and eliminate a big expense annually for the maintenance of these Highways.

True, the County pays 20 per cent of cost, but doubtless arrangements can be made with the Government to carry over a considerable portion of this, until next year, as has previously been done.

Only this last year or two has Grey been at any expense for paving within its borders. Almost all other counties have already paid their share for paving their main highways when construction costs were much higher than now. Grey has yet approximately 60 miles of main highways still to be paved, and 10 or 15 miles of it this summer would provide a good deal of employment on a useful work, at a time when this employment is urgently needed.

It is to be hoped Grey representatives will next week follow the example set by Wellington, and authorize the Government to proceed with paving the balance of No 6 Highway. The Minister and officers of the Dept. of Highways are ready and anxious to complete this road, and await only the County's sanction.

GOOD PRICE FOR HANOVER BONDS

The issue of some \$9,400 of Hanover debentures found a ready market locally, all of the ten bonds having been sold within three days after the issue was announced for sale in the Post.

This price, of course, was very attractive, being 97.5 for six per cent bonds, this making the yield almost six and one half per cent. It shows that there is considerable money being held for profitable investment.

The council are very gratified at the success of this issue. Having some \$50,000 of trunk sewer and disposal plant debentures to sell, there was at one time a disposition to offer about \$20,000 for sale locally, but it has been many years since any loans have been floated locally and therefore it was not known just how such an issue would be received. As a result, options were given to Toronto brokerage houses and they placed some \$40,000 bonds. This left about \$9,000 and as they were for short terms,—one to ten years—they were not readily saleable among companies and individuals seeking a longer-term investment for their funds.—Hanover Post.
