I LIKE THE DEPRESSION IN DAYS OF YORE

15 YEARS AGO

Pte Wesley Morton of town, who was reported seriously wounded three weeks ago, was injured in side, according to a letter received by his mother from his chaplain yesterday.

On leaving Ayton for his new appointment in Arthur, Rev Father Ferguson was presented with an appreciative address from the members of St Peter's Church there.

Yeovil: The majority of autos in our neighborhood are Fords, but the past week has seen a Maxwell arrive at P. Mutch's and an Overland at D. Eccles'.

To-night, Thursday, a public meeting will be held in the Town Hall, the Mayor presiding. The purpose is to acknowledge the boys who have taken the farm option to help production, instead of examinations, by presenting them with badges. SWINTON PARK

In this locality last week, the farmers met with many disappointments on account of weather conditions and much hay was damaged by rain. Early Friday morning there was a small cyclone—wind, rain and hail. Fences and trees were blown down and some fields of grain were badly spoiled. And this even when the great Economic Conference at Ottawa is endeavoring to legislate or devise a way whereby we may spend all we have and still have an abundance. But when we all do our part and the governments have done their very best, then by Providence, the depression will be lifted.

During last week we spent considerable time where there was no talk of depression. There were things of more importance to think of. On Monday last week, James Aldcorn of Corbetton met with a very severe accident and was taken to Orangeville Hospital, where for four days the doctor gave no hope of recovery; but he being Scotch, persisted in living and on Friday, the Dr said he would apparently live. We write this, knowing that many Review readers in the West are interested. And also to say a good word for our local hospitals. As we wandered about five days and nights we talked with some patients as well as their friends, who were anxiously watching over them. While we noted each day the changes of hope or of fear in the countenances of each one, we also noticed there was no talk of depression, but that everyone was willing to spend an expensive word for those loved ones.

Orangeville hospital is one of the smaller, 35 beds, and at present, pretty well filled with patients of all ages. They are from the babe of a few days to men and women of 70. And all so kindly and efficiently waited on by those ladies of the lamp, as Florence Nightingale was called. What progress has been made along these lines. Of course a hospital is an expensive institution, but when you consider the help and comfort bestowed in the time of need, where night and day the quiet, cheerful face of the nurse is ever on duty, we say all praise to doctors, hospitals and nurses. And we forget many of our small worries.
