The death of Mr. Ball took place at 11 o'clock Monday evening, August 8th, resulting immediately from a stroke of paralysis he suffered that morning. For two months previous he had not enjoyed good health, weak spells overcoming him. But he was always able to be up and around and his sudden passing caused a shock to his neighbors and friends. He was born in 1879, thus making him 53 years of age.

## Durham's Tax Rate Struck at 49 Mills

A tax rate three mills below that of last year's, or for several years, is welcome news to Durham ratepayers. At Monday night's council session, By-laws 935 and 936 were passed, striking town and school rates, and after some discussion 49 mills was the rate carried. For four previous years it had been 52 and in 1927 it was raised to 48. Several of the Council favored making it the even 50 this year, but Reeve Bell's motion, after he had spoken and pointed out that 49 would carry the town through in a year when taxes would be difficult to raise, was carried by a vote of 4 to 3.

The general town rate at 11.1 mills is up considerably, largely due to an additional amount of \$2240 struck for to pay over to Public Utilities Com. for use of hydrants. Credit for the reduced rate is almost entirely due to the reduced estimates furnished by the two School Boards. The High School requirements are reduced \$1310 to \$4040, a saving of 2 mills, and Public School's lowered \$1910 to \$6200, a 3 mill saving. County rate is \$270 less, almost 1/2 mill, this year's payment being \$4860.

Communications were read from Ontario Dept. of Lands and Forests, re placing people on relief on lands, and from Sec'y Ellis of Ontario Relief Board, regarding municipal relief. J. W. Ewen asked permission to encroach upon south end of Countess St. to build a wing wall of the new dam he plans to erect this fall. Council was agreeable as street is not in use there, but Mayor Murdoch stated that street would first have to be legally closed in space required. Council will inspect it.

Accounts totalling \$977.78 were passed, also a bill of \$12 to Crown Attorney W. D. Henry for services in a Durham court case.

Durham Hospital presented a bill of \$14 for care of an indigent wayfarer, named Fletcher, from Amherst, Nova Scotia, who was picked up on highway, near Mt Forest very ill, and taken to Dr Sneath's office for attention. The latter found his temperature very high, and stated hospital the place for him. Reeve Bell mentioned he had informed those concerned that the town was not liable for his keep, and the clerk was instructed to notify the hospital that town was not in favor of paying the account.

A resolution was carried requesting the Public Utilities Com. to extend the pipe lines supplying water on to College St., the most westerly street in town.

The controversy of the night came over Sunday band concerts. Mayor Murdoch stated he had been in touch with Chesley band, who wished to come here and put on a Sunday night program. The Mayor had informed them that one night's use wouldn't warrant fixing up band stand and wiring it for lighting, but if for 3 or 4 nights, the local Com. would probably get it ready, and to this the band was agreeable.

Reeve Bell entered a strong protest against allowing Sunday night band concerts. There had been a big kick registered against them a few years ago when started and they had been dropped. The band was not coming here primarily to give Durham citizens music; their object was to make money on Sunday, when they expected biggest collections. He would welcome them any week night, but such concerts Sunday, even if after church hours, detracted from church attendance and interest, and the town churches are having enough of a struggle now as it is, to keep up attendance in summer.

Couns. Kress and Catton spoke in favor of the Sunday night concert, and sponsored a motion to ask Chesley band to come any time they wished to do so. Reeve Bell demanded the yeas and nays on this motion, to let citizens know Council's attitude on the question, which was given:

## Hundreds Pay Tribute to Dead at Priceville Memorial Service

The fifth annual memorial service to the memory of the departed soldiers of Priceville and vicinity, was held on the grounds surrounding the monument there, on Sunday afternoon, and a gathering of one thousand, or possibly more, assembled for the occasion. It was perhaps the largest audience yet, to participate in this service, and a morning which had been threatening, changed into a bright, ideal afternoon. This and the presence of Hanover Concert Band, doubtless increased the number attending from a distance.

The two churches in Priceville joyfully do their part in making the service a success and a massed choir, along with Hanover Band, led in the singing of the hymns.

The Band under the leadership of Bandmaster Mahann, came 28 strong, and their excellent and appropriate sacred music added much to the service. Hanover has always maintained a splendid band, and the present one ranks in the forefront of these musical organizations. Their instrumental with bell-ringing effects, provided a pleasing accompaniment to several numbers.

The service was in charge of Mr. John McQuaker of Owen Sound, one of Grey County's best known public men and a prominent church and civic worker. In his opening remarks, Mr McQuaker, who was Chairman of Grey County Recruiting League in 1915, mentioned his visit to Priceville at that time, and paid tribute to the ready response of many fine young men from the neighborhood.

He also told of visiting Canadian graves and battlefields on the Western front a few years after the war's close.

The large flag hung at half mast, on the fine new flag pole adjoining the monument, while Mr M. A. Sorsollet, Deputy Minister of Public Welfare for Ontario, reverently placed the Government's wreath at the monument, and Bandmaster Mahann sounded the last post, after which the flag was run up to the top. Mrs Wm Arrowsmith, Markdale, rendered a fine solo.

Miss Macphail, M. P., was the first speaker. "We seek", she stated, "to honor the spirit of sacrifice, courage and bravery." The soldiers had fellowship of spirit, which exists even yet among the living. She recalled the long four years of war, the heart-comings, sometimes long delayed, the restlessness of many of these after coming back. Her hatred of war, she remarked, was born in those years. From 1920 to 1924 the soldiers faced the greatest illusion of all—they had to meet life in all its starkness and injustice. The war has not yet won for the world freedom and justice. The giving of our lives for others was the highest type of heroism, but there are other heroes as well, such as those who arrive at bringing up families respecting the highest and best in life. We need courage now to look towards the vision of a finer world.

Mr E. D. McClocklin, Durham, also gave a splendid address. People who are qualified to tell of war, he remarked, such as the soldier, the clergy, the statesman, or the poet should do so, but as he did not come under any of these heads, he would not be expected to. He recalled the sacrifices and hardships encountered by our forefathers, the pioneers of our land, and averred that service to our fellow men should be instilled into people's minds. A well-rendered poem "The Sons of Martha" by Kipling, concluded his address.

The speaker of the day was Mr. Sorsollet, Deputy Minister of Welfare. He expressed the Minister's regrets at being unable to attend. Most wars, he said, are productive of literature, but little seemed to have evolved from the Great War but that beautiful little poem "In Flanders Fields", written in the heat of action, which he recited. ## In Canada's Capital City

Mr John McCoskery one of the many Summer Tourists to Ottawa. — His Impressions of a Beautiful City.

It was our pleasure on Tuesday to have a real old time talk with Mr. J. McCoskery on his trip to Ottawa. It was not as one of a delegation that our friend went, but as one of the many tourists that visited the capital during Conference week. The "old-time talk" proved to be a one-sided affair, for Mr McCoskery did the talking and we did the listening. And it was worth listening to, for the gentleman in question didn't miss much. We have had Ottawa described to us from many phases and angles, but all some get from it, is that the Prime Minister of Canada and Governmental General put up there. When a tourist party is sight-seeing from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m., with no meal in between, it is sufficient evidence of the interest held by the visitors. This was what the McCoskery party did.

First, let us tell the personnel of the party. They comprised our townsman, his brother and wife, Mr and Mrs Donald McCoskery, Toronto, and Mrs McCoskery's aunt, Mrs Kitchen, Toronto, a remarkably smart lady, just past eighty two years. They travelled in the latter's splendid 7-passenger motor by easy stages along the Kingston-Ottawa highway on the 31st August, reaching Carleton Place that evening, where they remained over night. The eastern section of the province was suffering from the drought and very little crop of any kind was the result. Potatoes were only scrub height. The traffic preceding Civic Holiday into Ottawa was very heavy and the presence in that city of distinguished Imperial Conference delegates, served to make it more so.

Early Monday morning they entered Ottawa and on the city limits, were approached by a uniformed officer, who jumped on car and asked them their objective. They were simply Canadian tourists wanting to see the most of Ottawa in a limited time. Accordingly this official brought them directly in front of Parliament Buildings, went within a few moments and came back with a younger official, introducing him thus: "This is Alex. McIntyre, who is at your disposal."
