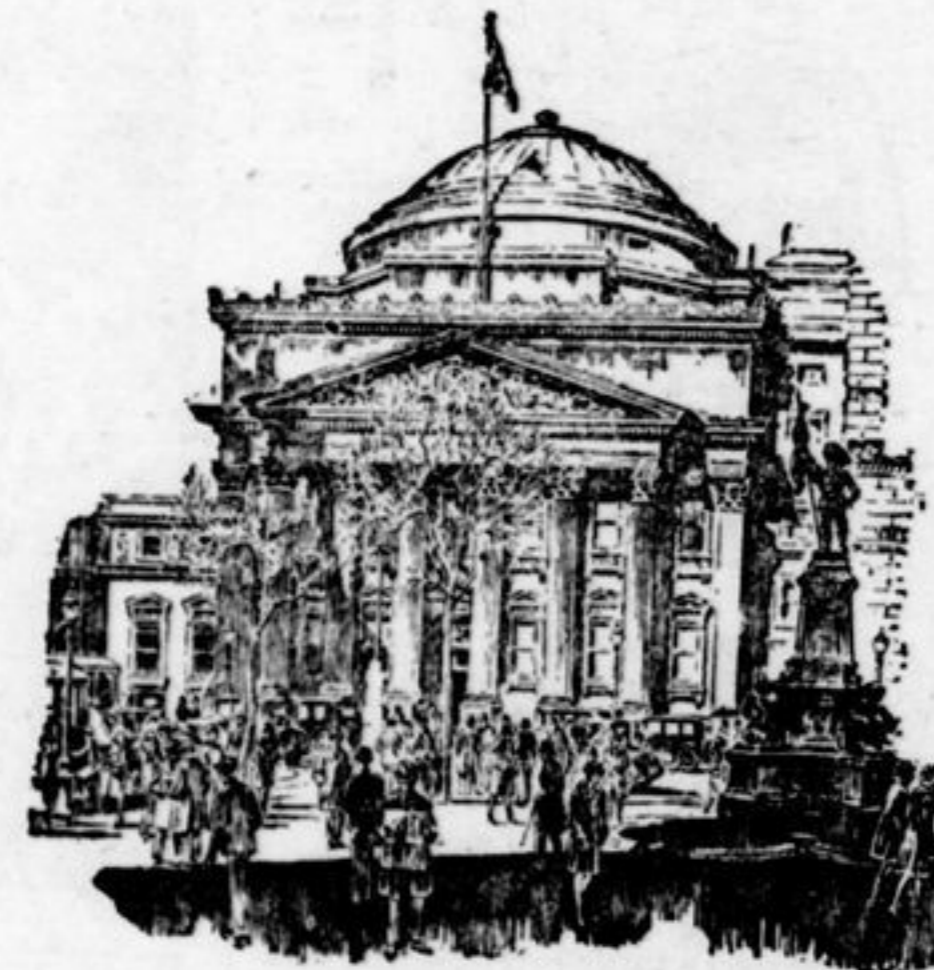

Elders ask to be Reinstated

Suspended from Office at Norwich Church

EXPECT A SETTLEMENT

Pastor's Resignation is Rejected by Presbytery

Six elders suspended from office at Knox Presbyterian Church, Forest, have moved for re-instatement and at the same time it became known Rev. Dr D. B. Marsh, minister and astronomer, had placed his resignation in the hands of Paris Presbytery only to have it rejected.

A statement from the Paris Presbytery said: "Owing to unsatisfactory conditions at Knox Church, Norwich, Dr Marsh one week ago, placed his resignation in the hands of the Paris Presbytery. The Presbytery did not see fit to accept his resignation, but sent a commission to investigate, with the result that the minister was exonerated and several elders of the church congregation left themselves open to suspension. In the meantime the Presbytery is dealing with the situation and an amicable settlement is looked for."

Cause of Trouble. The trouble was said to have its origin in frequent differences between Dr Marsh and the choir and the Young People's Society of the church over the entire period of his three years as minister.

It came to a head last spring, it was said, when the choir walked out following what its members considered a criticism of themselves from the minister.

Since that time the church has been without a choir and a number of members, sympathizing with the attitude of the choir, have refused to attend services. As a result the board has experienced difficulties in financing the church.

The church session and choir were unable to reach an agreement on the difficulties and called in the Paris Presbytery which also failed to bring a reconciliation.

Complaints Groundless. The Presbytery thereafter appointed a commission, which met and heard complaints of the congregation against Dr Marsh and found them groundless.

Decision of the commission was read at last Sunday's service. Subsequently the committee, at a meeting Thursday night, asked each elder individually if he would be behind the minister in an effort to promote harmony. Six negative answers brought automatic suspension.
