One of Glenelg township's most respected pioneers passed to his reward on Sunday, Oct 16th, in the person of Samuel McDermid, at the age of 76 years. He was the last of his generation. Three years ago he suffered a stroke from which he never wholly rallied, and the last six months he has been bedfast, though conscious to the last.

Deceased was born in Erin Township and when eight years of age, came with his parents to Glenelg, when they took up the home farm on the South Line, 41 con 2, S.D.R., which has ever since been his home. About 47 years ago he was married in Proton Tw'p, to Miss Frances Jane Bell, who survives him with a family of one daughter and three sons. Mrs Roy Brett (May) of Toronto; Samuel of Priceville; Harold, of Durham and Roy at home. There are six grandchildren.

The deceased was widely known and esteemed as neighbor and friend. He formerly belonged to the Disciple faith, but in recent years has been associated with the Saints. Mr Blair of Shelburne, conducted the funeral service on Tuesday afternoon, amid a large gathering of mourners and friends. Interment was made in McDermid's cemetery, Priceville.
