Badly Injured in Motor Collision
(Miss Loughran and daughter Mary in following accident. The relatives of Mrs. J. J. Burgess and have visited in Durham at various times.)

On Saturday evening, shortly after six o'clock, Mrs. Elizabeth Loughran of Markdale was seriously injured in a motor accident one mile west of Elmira, when she suffered the fracture of both knees.

Behind two motor cars a farmer's team and wagon figured in the accident, but only the two cars crashed. Andrew Wilson and son Chas. were driving east into Elmira, while Mrs. Loughran and her daughter Mary were going west. The team and wagon of Philip Deasel, whose cousin, Theobald, was driving from one of the lower fields to the barnyard, suddenly loomed up before Mr. Wilson, who was driving his car at a fair rate of speed, and the wagon being without lights. He swung his car quickly to the left to pass when he saw the Loughran car approaching. He jammed on the brakes and before he could clear his car, the auto driven by Mary Loughran crashed into the Wilson car, resulting in the painful injuries to Mrs. Loughran and two badly wrecked cars. And Wilson suffered some minor cuts and bruises when his car overturned on the road.

The accident was immediately reported to the police for investigation and in the meantime Mrs. Loughran was removed to the Kitchener-Waterloo hospital, where her injuries received surgical attention.

As a result of the collision the provincial police laid three charges with the magistrate. Mary Loughran, daughter of the injured woman, has been charged with driving a car while still a minor. Police say she is but 15 years old. Claire Wilson, Elmira, driver of the other car which figured in the smash, is charged with reckless driving, while Philip Deasel, of Elmira, is charged with driving a horse-drawn vehicle after dark without lights.

In the collision, both cars were badly damaged. Mr. Wilson's car seemed almost beyond repair while the Loughran auto is said to have been damaged to the extent of \$200. —Elmira Signal.
