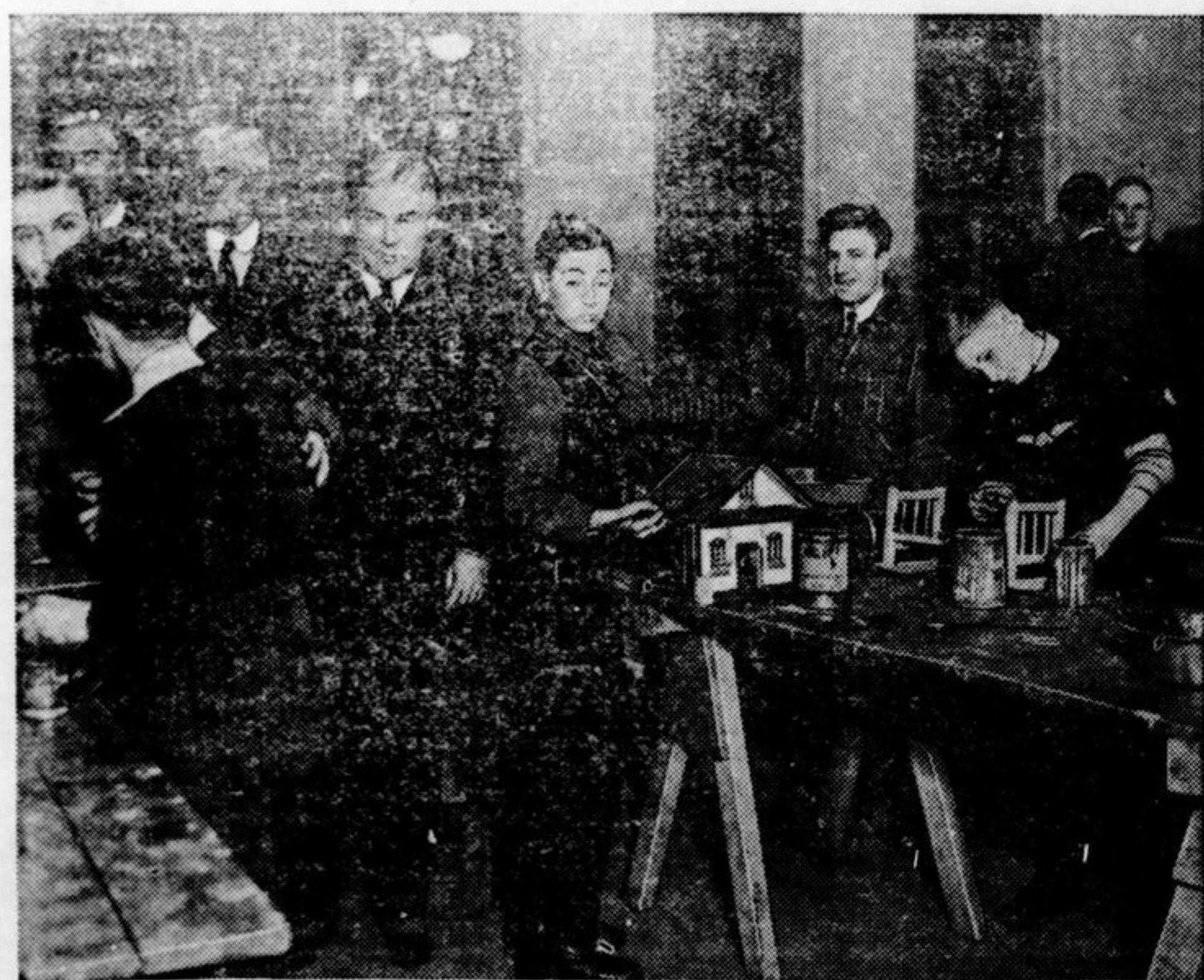

BEATTY MEETS SCOUTS



Honesty, courage and modesty are the cardinal virtues that make for success and they should be the ideal of every Canadian boy, said E. W. Beatty, chairman and president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, in addressing the Montreal District Scout Council at their headquarters in that city recently. Mr. Beatty was speaking in his capacity as president of the Canadian General Council of the Boy Scouts' Association and at a function at which he had been presented with a copy of the new Scout song book, "Songs for Canadian Boys." The appeal of this book is to all classes of boys and girls, to adults and to the English-speaking world generally. Some of the finest poems in the language are included, making the book an anthology in itself. The songs include those common to the Empire, songs of Canada, England, Scotland, Ireland, Wales, the United States, French-Canada, France, sea songs, sea chantes, scouting and marching songs, choruses and miscellaneous songs. The French-Canadian song group have scholarly English translations by J. Murray Gibbon. It is a book that would adorn the shelves of any library. Mr. Beatty made a complete inspection of the Scouts' Montreal premises and evinced lively interest in the toy shop where hundreds of old and damaged toys were being put into shape and renovated for distribution among the poor and destitute children at Christmas. CRAWFORD

The annual Xmas entertainment of Crawford S. S., was held Tuesday, Dec 20. The weather and roads were ideal and the church was well filled. A splendid Christmas program was presided over in his usual capable manner, by the pastor Rev. Mr. Heoney. Special features of "All programme were: a pantomime, acted by the Power of Jesus name" by five young ladies, the solo being sweetly sung by Miss Ina Dolphin. A Christmas play and pageant "where lies the child" was exceedingly well presented. An amusing pantomime, acted by Ernie Brigham and Miss L. Here and There

Britishers are eating Canadian eggs this year with their breakfast bacon. Estimates for 1931 place a figure of 26,000 cases, each of 30 dozen eggs, for export to Great Britain. Last year it was only 6,500 cases. The fur trade is still one of Canada's big assets. In 1927 furs to the value of 556,000 francs were exported to France. Last year their value was placed at \$17,187,398, mostly to Great Britain and the United States. Grain traffic handled by the Canadian Pacific for October last shows a considerable increase over that carried for October, 1930. A total of 17,521 cars was loaded last month from the Prairie Provinces as compared with a total of 12,573 cars in October, 1930. Idle since the first week of October, the mill of the British Empire Steel plant at Sydney, N.S., is again in operation, giving full time employment of six days a week to upwards of 200 men. They are rolling soft steel for a number of orders recently placed with the company. With a trail mileage of 7,162 miles to his credit and having to date seen 424 moose, 69 caribou and 494 deer in New Brunswick, E. L. Pope, of Boston, Mass., is back in the New Brunswick forests on his 27th hunting trip in 29 seasons. He will spend several weeks on this trip. Nat. Cornfoot, colorful golf pro at the Canadian Pacific Langara course, Vancouver, for the past five and a half years, sailed by the Empress of Russia recently for Tokio where he will act as golf instructor at the Fuji Shokai Club course. This organization operates a huge indoor layout in addition to its outdoors links.
