Report of Durham Public Utilities Commission

According to the number of householders in the town of Durham who are enjoying the benefits of having connections installed to water service, it is quite evident that non-takers do not appreciate the advantages to be derived both for their own convenience and to the general economic service to the corporation.

As the system is a direct charge against the Corporation, it is the duty of every householder to have the interest of the town at heart and to do to have the service installed where-by your project will show a profit. It may be stated here that this project was inaugurated in 1930 and 1931 for the general welfare of the town, as well as a measure for the relief of unemployment, and should be carried through to a successful and profitable end.

It is not generally understood but it is a fact that any profit derived from the service must be turned over to the Town Treasurer and such profit is used to reduce the general tax rate. Hence, the more water users, the more profit, with greater reduction in taxes, and it is low assessment with low tax rate which will induce manufacturers to locate in your locality.

There are 301 domestic installations, with possible 425, showing the number of non-takers to be 124, who, if installing service, connections only, would increase sales by the sum of \$568.00, with an estimated profit of at least \$600.00, which would reduce the general tax rate by one mill.

In the course of a few years the indebtedness will drop, the service become more efficient, and the profits should be large enough to reduce the general rate from 3 to 4 mills. You will note from the following figures that the use of the gas pump is of considerably greater cost than the use of the electric pump: so use of the gas pump should be curtailed to the minimum.

Hydro Department
This Department after consulting the engineers of the Ontario Commission, undertook to rehabilitate the local power lines this year, not only as the lines needed renewal on account of increased load since inception, but also as unemployment relief measure for many a your town, who sorely needed the work.

In this work your commission spent \$4400.00 of which the sum of \$2300 was paid for wages. When this work was undertaken the Ontario Commission Engineers advised that the 13th Bill to your town would be less than \$400 of either a credit or debt. Shortly after the bulk of rehabilitation material was received or in transit we received a 13th Power Bill of \$3513.67 deficit for the year 1931 which was certainly unexpected.

To meet these two accounts your commission was forced to sell \$7000.00 of Bonds but still have enough surplus to doubly cover the bonded indebtedness of the Hydro Department. The Commission are faced with the following accounts: The Durham share of exchange on Ontario Hydro Electric bonds sold in New York and payable in New York funds for cost of Chippewa Development accrued from Jan. 1, 1932 to July 30, 1932, \$542.70; Exchange on three power bills, August, September and October, \$221.20; Plus an increase of power cost from \$32.00 per H. P. to \$42.00 per H.P. retroactive from July 31 to Jan. 1, totalling \$1417.02.

These accounts which total \$2181.10 are in dispute generally throughout the Georgian Bay district, and when they were received, your commission were very active in formulating a large and now powerful Association, now known as the Georgian Bay Municipal Electric Association, who are preparing arguments, to be presented at the January Hydro Convention, protesting against the payments of these accounts.
