Being the best stick-handler in this district, his absence for the balance of the season will be a hard blow to the Senior hockey club's prospects. He played top-notch hockey in the Warton and Owen Sound games and everyone is pulling for him to make a quick recovery.

**The Late James Sealey** There passed away in Toronto on New Year's Day, James Sealey, the cause of death being a cancerous nature. He was 88 years of age and a bachelor. He was born in England and came with his parents at the age of 5 years to Canada where he grew up to young manhood and engaged in farming. Some 25 years ago he quit farming and for 23 winters has made his home with his nephew Mr. Henry Eckhardt. Mrs. John Eckhardt, (a Sealey) died 44 years ago; a sister of hers, Mrs Edmond, 11 years ago; a brother Arthur Sealey died 7 years ago, while brothers Joseph and Henry passed away four years ago. Thus does Death make inroads among families. The deceased, James Sealey, has of recent years made his home near Woodstock, where he was highly respected.

#### MRS W. E. BUCHAN

A person much beloved in the earlier days of Durham, has passed away in the person of Mrs Walter E. Buchan, in her 80th year. For the past 14 years, Mrs Buchan has made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Dr. Woods, of Bayfield, where she received every home comfort and care. A stroke of paralysis a month or so ago, doubtless hastened the end, though at times it appeared as if she was making a wonderful rally. Death took place Saturday morning.

Previous to her marriage to the late Walter E. Buchan, she was known as Jane Ellen Lauder, her parents living on the farm just north of Durham, now the Lawson farm. Deceased was the last surviving member of a family of five daughters and one son, viz: "Gladys", Mrs W. E. Turner, Mrs S. P. Saunders, Mrs. Wilson, Lorraine, Ohio, and one brother William, of Varney.

After her marriage the young couple lived on the Scarf farm, then on farm at Varney, east of highway and north of track, for a year. To Durham they moved in 1885 and then in the prime of life were active in many activities of the town at this time. For 35 years was Mrs Buchan a valued member of Durham Presbyterian choir and was always in her place in the alto section. There are few communities adjacent to Durham who were not privileged to hear her at some old-time soiree or tea-meeting. One Scotch character song that won for her much praise, was that fish-wife song, "Gladys Herrin" in costume. Of the song she gave a realistic touch as she threw the herring among her audience. Apart from her musical gifts, she was a true friend and neighbor and many recall her kindly manner and bearing. Of the union were born four children, three sons and one daughter: Ewing, of Saskatchewan, who returned west only two weeks ago from visiting his mother; Lauder, of Windsor; William of Dunville and Margaret, Mrs (Dr) Woods, Bayfield. Also a niece, Dell Lauder (Mrs Dr Lewis) mourns as a daughter, having been a member of the family from infancy.

The remains were brought to Durham Monday, by motor hearse from Bayfield for interment beside deceased's husband in Durham cemetery. In the absence of Rev B. D. Armstrong through illness, Rev W. H. Smith conducted the services in the Presbyterian Church, before remains were laid to rest. The pall bearers were: Dr. Pickering, Dr. Grant, T. M. McCadden, P. Ramage, W. S. Hunter, O. S. Hunter.

The treacherous flu which has brought sickness and sorrow to many homes, was also prevalent here and was the immediate cause of death.
