Liberal Leader Discusses the C. C. F. in House

Miss Masphail's Weekly Letter

One hears all kinds of rumors in the corridors and offices regarding re-distribution. To-day it was reported that the bill would not go through at this session but would be laid over till next year.

In different parts of the province of Ontario, a petition has been circulating asking the Gov't to take measures which would result in the raising of prices of farm products.

Members of our group who have interrupted Mr King after each of his astounding statements, had it not been that we believed that Alfred Masphail who speaks very well, was to follow a Gov't speaker who came immediately after Mr King.

"In view of the fact that the present prices of farm products necessitate from two to three times the amount of farm produce to meet payments on debts and other fixed charges as was contemplated when these were incurred;

"And of the further fact that the prices of what the farmer has to buy have fallen but little, so that the loss of purchasing power of the farmer

has crippled the commercial and industrial life of Canada; We believe that immediate and drastic action must be taken by the Dominion Gov't to avoid widespread bankruptcy and suffering.

"That the Gov't shall institute an immediate control of the merchandise of the foreign exchanges along the lines practiced in Australia, New Zealand and many other countries for the purpose of reducing the exchange value of the Canadian dollar in terms of sterling to such a degree as will bring about a marked increase in the Canadian price of export commodities thereby re-establishing a more just relationship between debtors and creditors, buyers and sellers.

"Until these measures have become effective we demand a stay of proceedings for the collection by forced sale of other obligations."

The Rt Hon Mackenzie King spoke for two hours on the Co-operative Commonwealth resolution, the first half of which time was devoted to his interpretation of what the C. C. F. stands for. Mr King says it stands for public ownership of everything and even went so far as to argue that we were against voluntary co-operation and public ownership as it operation is now understood, as exemplified by the post office, hydro, etc.

In the province of Ontario at the moment, there is a moratorium which protects the land-owner who has not been able to meet his contractual obligations, as to the payment of principal and it is now reported that the moratorium will be extended so as to protect the farmer on his land.

The farmers of Sask. with much greater arrears in payment of interest and principal than the Ontario farmers, were very anxious to have inserted in the C. C. F. declaration of principles "the guarantee of security of tenure for the farmer on his use-land and for the worker in his home."

Had Mr King been as clever as he usually is on constitutional matters, he would have recognized that the title deeds of land come under Provincial jurisdiction.

The last hour of the speech was spent in talking of Liberal principles and the pronouncements made from time to time by Gladstone, Laurier, etc. and laying down what he called the "fourteen points of Liberalism".

The Co-operative Commonwealth Federation believes in voluntary co-operation by both producers and consumers, favoring gov't help by way of loans at very low rates of interest and the loaning of experts by the Dept. of Agriculture when, or at any time that the unit in the country or city feels that it needs expert help.

We believe that finance should be nationalized and that all great monopolies should be brought under gov't supervision and public utilities socially owned. We believe that social services will be greatly extended as time goes on but we do not believe in the elimination of private property unless it is of such an individual nature that the rights of many individuals are being ignored. At the moment, the Bank of Montreal or C.P.R. are private property, but not in the same sense of the ownership of a grocery retailer or hardware store, a blacksmith shop, a mill, a factory or a farm.

The Bank of Montreal and the C.P.R. are in the nature of public utilities privately owned.

Poverty of mind and estate is a manifestation of contentedness.

Laborers, if they were properly discontented, would raise the character and quality of their work, and would receive higher pay.

Men and women in salaried jobs doing manual or clerical work are unlikely to receive promotion if they exhibit contentedness.

Things beyond us are made known to us by and in advertisements. Advertisements are designed to stir us out of bovine content by putting pictures before us—pictures of the imagination. Tales pictures create longings in us, and longings find a way of translating themselves into purpose, ambition and resolution.

NOT THE news, not the information, not the entertaining and educational articles contained in newspapers and magazines are the pushers of us toward something better and higher; it is the advertisements in them. They are urgent and narrow-purposed and are vivid. They are deliberately devised to make us do something.

Perhaps contentment is permissible in those who have reached their seventieth birthday, but those younger than 70 who say they are completely content merely say that they have collapsed mentally and physically.

Ideals change, desires change, objectives change. But never should any of us be contented. And we'll never be contented if we keep reading advertisements.
