NATION DICTATORS OF TO-DAY

An admirable cartoon showed up in the Detroit Sunday Times of "A Discouraged World" where four of the dictators of the present day stand on this "discouraged world's body" and in no uncertain tone predict that they are the modern prophets to lead the world out of its "slough of despond."

Hitler, the German dictator, says over the body: "At last, I come to rule by race and class hatred! Down with the German Republic! I am the Law!

Kemal of Turkey says: "Do as I command, I am the modern prophet!" Mussolini of Italy says: "Listen to me, there has been too much talk about liberty; the world needs discipline!"

Stalin of Russia, says: "Leave it to me; Karl Marx, Lenin and our five year plan!"

Three of these four men have proved their powers to survive the rough storms of dictatorship and most remarkable, they have thus far survived the greatest danger and unlimited power upon a man's own self, his soundness of judgment.

The three that have successfully endured unlimited power and its dangers for years, holding their power and keeping a hold on themselves are Mussolini of Italy, Stalin of Russia, Kemal Pasha of Turkey.

Hitler of Germany, latest to join the ranks of the dictators has still to win his spurs by showing that he can last, in a field where the smallest danger is assassination, and the great danger egotism and conceit.

Perhaps he imagines himself another Frederick the Great, or a combination of Frederick and Mussolini.

In these imaginings would lie his greatest danger. A man who really succeeds—Caesar, Napoleon, Cromwell, Mussolini or Stalin—is himself. You do not find successful imitations in History.
